Plain Truths About Etiquette

By Emily Post (Copyright 1930 by Collier's) Just why so many people focus all etiquette consciousness on table manners is not possible to explain. The only parallel that I can think of is the expression that nine people out of 10 put on in a photographer's studio. Instead of looking and behaving as she does everywhere and every day, the loveliest woman imaginable suddenly does something strained and queer with the outline of her mouth and the pulse of her hand the moment she finds herself in front of a camera. "Do whatever is natural and don't think about it." This undermost circumstance is the very best advice—providing that your natural impulses are not likely to affront the ordinary requirements of civilized behavior. The everyday rule of utmost importance is to do nothing that can offend the sensibilities of others. This is very short and simple and all sufficient if we happen to know the sensibilities of those with whom we come in contact. Most of us have our own special prejudices, certain mannerisms, rudenesses, words, actions—even objects, affect our sensibilities exactly as water poured over her back is supposed to affect a cat. Screaming voices and loud, raucous laughter, any behavior that attracts unpleasant attention in public places, table manners or other habits like those of an animal are offensive to all people of ordinary decency. The manners of all of us belong in one of five general classes: ignorantly lacking, somewhat lacking, perfecting, somewhat overdone or imitation. And of them all, the last are the worst! Once in a while you see people who are not completely veneered with manners—isms that you can scarcely resist shouting "fire!" or "stand dog!" just to see what they are like when natural. Impudent manners belong most often to people who have voices strangled with sweetness and whose gestures suggest a diver's motions under the sea. The assumed superiority that you are intended to be impressed by is most unlikely to be suggestive of true breeding. These over-mannered people are most often the chief offenders in their unawareness of most taboos of behavior—and did they but know it, every taboo of speech, invariably they "attend," "presume," "desire," "purchase," "retire," and complacently crush every taboo in the vocabulary of social tradition. My most acute prejudice is against the use of certain words or phrases. The reason why I object to this particular taboo so much is that certain ones are constantly jumping out at me from the printed page. Yesterday, in a supposedly high class magazine, I began a paragraph about Lindbergh, only to find that he had "attended"—I have no idea what. Another special pariah is the phrase "in the home." The only difference between "I seen it" or "was you" and "I attended" or "in the home" is that the first examples are bad grammar and the second bad taste. Of the four, the first two are to be preferred because at least they are not pretending to be "refined." Apart from a few special taboos of speech, perfect behavior means merely that you have sufficient tact and innate sensibility to meet the various circumstances of life without conscious thought. People who are genuine and simple and unpretentious can seldom get far wrong in any of the details that really count.

Women to 'Run' California Prison As Test of Corrective Penology

SACRAMENTO, Cal. (AP)—An Alpine village, 4,000 feet high in the Tehachapi mountains, soon will materialize feminine ideas of how a prison for women should be designed and run. There will be no "grim, grey walls," no watchtowers, no heavy barred windows, cell blocks or armed guards. The superintendents and all other employees, so far as practicable, will be women—yet it will house at the Sunset, 120 inmates now confined in San Quentin penitentiary, and ultimately will have accommodations for a maximum of 500. The new experiment in penology starts out with the idea in mind that the best penitentiary for women is the one which looks the least like one, and which has a "corrective" rather than a punitive atmosphere. Under plans formulated by a special prison commission appointed by Gov. C. C. Young, the physical characteristics of the institution will be that of a summer resort. Its official name will be "California Institute for Women." While there will be a unit for detaining inmates whose behavior is not considered good, the majority of women sent there will

be housed in cottages, each of which will have its own dining room and kitchen. Bedrooms are to be escape proof through use of a special steel mesh window in which angle cross grills of sturdy but ornate construction substitute for the usual heavy bars. Completed, the mountain village will be a group of architecturally attractive structures on a site of 1,682 acres surrounding a pretentious administration building.
