Medford's third annual outdoor Christmas lighting contest, details of which will be announced shortly, is expected to again demonstrate to the outside world that "Medford knows how." This beautiful Yuletide custom, which has been adopted by progressive communities throughout the country, was first introduced in southern Oregon in 1928, when the Medford Chamber of Commerce sponsored the first Christmas lighting program in this city. Attractive prizes were offered by enterprising business houses for the best displays and some excellent holiday lighting exhibits resulted. Last year the contest was repeated with even greater success.

LAST OXEN TAKES CRATERIAN TRAIL

He's the last oxen to cross the plains and he left his home at Phoenix at 6 o'clock this morning to be in Medford to pull the covered wagon on one more journey through the streets—the black and white animal owned by J. C. Berrang of Phoenix.

Mr. Berrang crossed the plains from Connecticut to Oregon with an ox team in 1924, traveling the original Oregon trail. One member of the team is dead and the surviving member pulls the wagon alone as he advertises "The Big Trail," pioneer picture, which opened at the Fox Craterian theatre today.

More than 50 pioneers, who made the journey west long before Mr. Berrang and his oxen, have registered at the Mail Tribune for tickets for "The Big Trail."

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FRESH AIR TAXI PROPOSITION UP TO CITY COUNCIL

When two colored men impersonating Amos 'n' Andy, and escorted by Walter Levereite and George Olson of the Holly theater "hunted" into the city council chamber last night all excited and lined up before the councilmen and mayor, they not only astonished the assemblage witnessing the council's doings but broke up the meeting with laughter for about 20 minutes.

Without waiting for permission Moses Levereite and Olson began indignantly protesting to the city officials that Amos 'n' Andy had been refused a license by City Recorder Alfrod yesterday afternoon for the "Fresh Air Taxicabs." They as taxpayers and their respected colored guests would stand for no such money business on the part of the city, etc. Then they demanded that their guests be not discriminated against because of their color.

"Wee if it's jest like this," said Amos to the city fathers, but he got no further as Andy rudely pushed him five feet back and exclaimed:

"As president of the Fresh Air Taxi Co., incorporated, I'll handle this."

Then Andy made an eloquent plea to be granted the license, in which he said: "We's explainin' six matter as a proposition to a white'n worshipping world and we ax that yo unlar nuff to check and double-check this proposition and not down us, yuh frens."

Andy presented the petition signed by about every business concern in town and civic and semi-civic or other body, even the Medford Public Schools, in behalf of the request. Even the business concerns of Councilman Mosler and Wing had signed, much to their surprise.

The council then voted unapologetically Mayor Pipe's move that the colored fresh air concern be given the license on their putting up a \$100,000 bond.
