BARNEBURG HAS OX SHOES WHICH TROD 'BIG TRAIL'

Shoes that left their imprint in the dust of one of the first "Big Trails" across the plains as oxen trod their way from Iowa to Oregon are now on display at McPherson's store, through the courtesy of the Fox Craterian theatre, at which the romantic motion picture of the westward emigration opens today.

The shoes were worn by a yoke of oxen driven by Frederick Barneburg, one of Oregon's earliest pioneers. They are now owned by his grandson, F. E. Barneburg. Frederick Barneburg made his first trip to Oregon in 1853, bringing a herd of horses. He returned east and made his second trip west the next spring, coming to the Rogue River valley. He stayed here six years, then returned to Iowa and organized a train of relatives and friends, who accompanied him on his last trip over the "Big Trail."

Soon after his arrival he accumulated 1600 acres of land and made his permanent home, east of Jackson county fair grounds. A portion of the property now owned by his eldest son, S. P. Barneburg is known as Barneburg hill and is one of the scenic spots of the valley.

ROSEBURG FORMS JOB COMMISSION

ROSEBURG, Dec. 3. - (AP) - The formation of a commission to handle the local unemployment situation was started here today, following a conference of the Roseburg chamber of commerce and city council. The situation was said to be not acute, but the steps were being taken to prevent a serious situation during the winter, if possible. The councilmen were instructed to make a survey of various wards to make a general clean-up and improvement of vacant property. The city will employ local labor exclusively on all municipal projects.
