PUTNAM PETITIONS SPECIAL ELECTION

FEHL FILES NEW CLAIM IN RECOUNT

Defeated Mayoralty Candidate Charges Irregularities in West Medford and Oakdale Precincts—Lead Pencil Use Cited.

Alleging that he was deprived of "50 or more votes" in the West Medford precinct, and "50 or more votes" in the Oakdale precinct, through alleged irregularities of the election boards, Earl H. Fehl, off-time candidate for mayor of Medford, through his attorneys, E. E. Kelly, E. C. Kelly and T. J. Enright, late yesterday filed an amended complaint for a recount of the votes.

The amended complaint was filed yesterday, to come within the provisions that a contest be filed within 30 days after the election date.

The complaint centers its allegations of irregularities in the West Medford and Oakdale precincts.

It is charged that in the West Medford precinct the election officials were appointed by the county clerk and not the county clerk as required by law.

The complaint charges that Harry Fehl, judge of the West Medford board, possessed a lead pencil "and used same unlawfully and unlawfully." The county clerk states that the law requires the election judge to have a lead pencil, so he can initial the ballots, after they have been counted.

The complaint charges that "Mrs. Maud Martin" and "Mrs. Maud Martin" were not regularly appointed. No persons of these names served. Mrs. Dorothy Matthews and Mrs. Maud M. Beckman did serve. In the Oakdale precinct, it is alleged that similar irregularities existed, and it is also charged that votes against Fehl were marked and that the ballots were marked in the open, where they could be seen. Miscounts are alleged, and it is claimed that Fehl carried both precincts.

The Oakdale precinct first board was composed of Mrs. Lydia Applegate, Mrs. Margaret Lewis, Mrs. Helen Herbert, Mrs. Mattie C. Schenck and Mrs. Freda Kingsley.

The counting board was composed of A. Orin Schenck, Ray L. Lewis, Mrs. Bertha Fornerock, Paul H. McDonald and M. W. Wagner. Mrs. Bertha Fornerock was the only substitution.

It is probable that the next step in the procedure will be the calling of a recount hearing, which is largely favored as a conciliatory step to stop the argument.
