

WEATHER FREAK NOTED HERE ON NOVEMBER 7TH

According to the meteorological notes for November by W. J. Hutchison, head of the Medford weather bureau, the weather of that month was characterized by the predominance of cloudiness accompanied by quite frequent light or dense fogs. Light rains occurred at scattered intervals with a fairly heavy rainfall on the 15th. Maximum temperatures were somewhat variable, ranging from 57 to 74 degrees and minimums below freezing were recorded on 23 days, however, average temperatures were generally not far from normal.

One of the most notable weather phenomena of the month was the sudden rise in temperature occurring on the 7th. About 4 p. m. the wind changed from northwest to west and the temperature rose from 55 to 62 degrees in approximately ten minutes. After reaching 62 degrees the temperature slowly receded and at 5:30 p. m. the wind again shifted westerly to the southeast and the mercury climbed from 58 to 74 degrees in fifteen minutes. No particularly noticeable movement of the barometer was observed but there was a slight lowering of the barometer and a considerable increase in wind velocity.

The sudden change was no doubt due to the warm southerly wind blowing in from the eastern side of a low pressure area having its center of disturbance several hundred miles off the Pacific coast.

There were several periods of foggy weather in November mostly of short duration. Air traffic in Medford was badly hampered on the 10th and 11th for the three days.

With the exception of a fairly heavy rain on the 15th, the rainfall was light and occurred at scattered intervals throughout the month. The total of 2.17 inches was of considerable aid to agricultural interests but not sufficient to equal the normal November rainfall which is 2.48 inches.

ZACH CAMERON, VALLEY PIONEER, GOES TO REWARD

Zach Cameron died at his home, 627 South Central avenue, Thursday morning after a long lingering illness. He was born in Van Buren county, Iowa, September 25, 1845. His parents, James and Caroline Cameron, came to Oregon in 1849, settling on the Applegate. For many years he was in the mercantile business at Uniontown, now known as Applegate, and for eight years operated the Cameron and Simmons mine at Walker with his brother Theodore and George Simmons. The mine at the present time is known as the Eberly mine. Since 1912 he has resided in Medford. He leaves one daughter, Mrs. Corinne Murphy of Medford who has tenderly cared for her father in his last illness, also one brother, William Cameron of Applegate, aged 88 years. Funeral services will be held at the Perle Rex, Mrs. E. Hamilton officiating. Interment will be in Medford cemetery and the remains will be interred by the side of his wife who died in 1912.

TINY DECREASE IN POSTAL RECEIPTS

For the first time in many months the monthly receipts of the Medford postoffice, instead of showing a substantial increase over the corresponding month of the previous year, fell down a trifle last month, being \$1.15 below the November receipts of last year. The November, 1929 receipts were \$914.79 and the November, 1929 receipts were \$913.64. This small decrease is explained by the fact that the third grade mailing permits, an advertising matter to go out through the Medford postoffice were considerably less than had been anticipated, and last month's receipts followed a 15 per cent increase over the October receipts of the previous year. It had been expected that last month's local receipts would show a small gain, but the falling down of the third class receipts prevented.

MRS. WAGNER DIES IN SAMS VALLEY AT RIPE OLD AGE

Mary A. Bloom Wagner died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. James E. Weaver of Sams Valley, Wednesday evening after an illness over the past year. Four years ago, on account of declining health, she came to Central Point to make her home with her daughter.

Mary A. Bloom was married to John A. Wagner at Cove, March 28, 1867. To this union was born eight children, two of whom, Mrs. Myrtle M. Davis, Atlantic City, New Jersey, and Mrs. Minnie E. Weaver of Sams Valley, survive. There are five grandsons, E. C. Fulp, Cove, Ore.; Earl W. Weaver, Sams Valley; Carl E. Weaver, Medford and Roy A. Weaver, Berkeley, Calif.; five great granddaughters, Mrs. Ruth Brazelle, Mrs. Mildred Paehler, Cove; Mrs. Ruby Sharp, Logan, Utah; Mrs. Frankie Fulp, La Grande, Ore.; Sally Jane Weaver, Medford; four great great grandchildren, Shirley Brazelle, Barbara J. Jackie and Bernard Sharp, four brothers, George, Idaho; Ira, Echo, Ore.; Douglas, San Francisco and Lewis, Cove; three sisters, Mrs. Sarah Ivers, Vale, Ore.; Mrs. Hattie Fisher, Joseph, Ore.; Mrs. Minnie McDaniel, Cove, and a host of friends besides her relatives who will mourn the passing of this good woman and mother.

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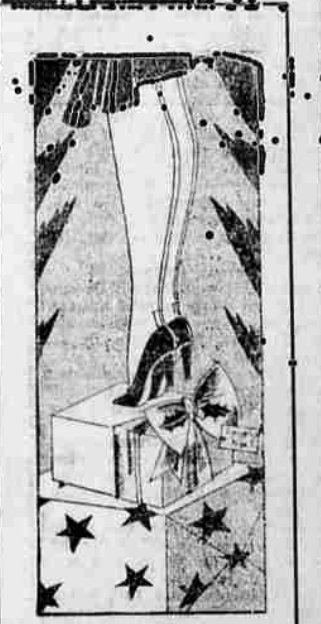
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
