TEST CONVINCED CEDAR SHINGLES FIRE RESISTANT

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis.—(Special)—A series of demonstration tests on the fire resistant qualities of Oregon cedar shingles, has convinced lumber dealers of the state that they have been entirely too modest in exploiting the virtues of a home product, reports T. J. Starker of the school of forestry here, who has co-operated with the Willamette Valley Lumber Institute in the demonstrations.

From six to eight panels of roof covering were made up, using old and new cedar shingles and various standard kinds of composition roofing. On each was placed a uniform sized firebrand made of kerosene-soaked excelsior and hardwood strips.

These brands were ignited and allowed to burn in minutes, if they would stay a few seconds, they were removed. The cedar shingles invariably went out in about six or after the loose material was consumed. The old shingles showed little more tendency to ignite, and in every case the area charred on the composition roofing was more than twice that blackened on the new cedar shingles.

"Persons observing these demonstrations, including old-time lumber men, changed their ideas upon actually seeing the high fire resistant qualities of wood shingles," said Professor Starker.
