NANKING BANS DANCE AS BAD FOR THE YOUNG

Popular Form of Recreation Forbidden Chinese Boys and Girls—Dancing Girls Jobless.

NANKING (AP)—The society leaders of this city's Chinese smart set are beginning to wonder what they can do with their spare time.

Dancing, the most popular form of recreation in the national capital of China, has been forbidden by the government on the ground that it tends to corrupt the morals of the young. With little else to do in the way of amusement, Chinese boys and girls are society up against it for some way to fill their idle moments.

Cause of Trouble
The order forbidding dancing was instigated by a group of moralists who believed that anything western, even music, could do the younger generation of China no good. Naturally it has caused plenty of trouble.

Dancing girls were thrown out of work and with the same field in Shanghai more or less overcrowded, they had no place to go, were caught with heavy investments and high-priced Filipino orchestras on their hands and there was nothing they could do about it.

Was Popular
Since Nanking was made the capital of China two and a half years ago, dancing had become very popular with the Chinese society leaders and every member of the smart set knew the latest ball-room steps.

General Liu Chi-Wen had most to do with popularizing dancing. He was mayor of the city when the Nationalists moved their government in and being fond of dancing himself, granted dancing permits to hotels and restaurants that might not have been issued otherwise.

His successor continued the practice of issuing dance hall permits and for a time everything was lovely. Then came the decree from the National government itself ordering the municipal authorities to abolish all dancing in the city.

Too many young people were going astray, the order stated, adding that dancing was largely to blame.

INTENSE SEARCH FOR CRAZY CONS

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Search for seven maniac-convicts who fled from the state hospital for the criminally insane at Matteawan after overpowering guards, was intensified today.

City police, state troopers and sheriff's forces were scouring New York and patrolling the 60-mile roadway from Beacon, N. Y.

Special guards watched the convict's former homes here, in Brooklyn, on Long Island and in Rochester, N. Y., and plain clothes men sought them in their known haunts.

FEDERAL LICENSE URGED ON PLANES

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 5.—(AP) Representatives of governors of seven western states were here today for the final day's session of the Western States Aeronautical association.

The association's program for today called for a study of how to finance a comprehensive airway system.

The most important action taken by the association at the opening meeting yesterday, in the opinion of the delegates, was the adoption of a resolution advocating laws that would require federal licenses for planes and pilots flying in the intra-state operation.

MIRRORED SAN XAVIER, ARIZ. Dec. 5.—(AP) Canned fires of the Papago Indians burned lower today as a tired, swirling circle of dancers approached the end of a three day ceremonial in honor of St. Francis Xavier.

Since Wednesday, when the whites in the adobe mission's wickered bell tower punctuated pontifical mass celebrated by Bishop Daniel J. Gercke of the Catholic diocese of Tucson, the arduous dancers have whirled through the multitudinous and ancient pantomimic rituals.

LOCATE WRECKAGE OF LONG LOST AIR LINER

PARIS, Dec. 5.—(AP) A Marseilles dispatch to Petit Parisien today said that part of the wreckage of the Italian air liner Irony, missing since Nov. 29, has been found by a fishing smack between Lencate and Port Vendres, 30 miles from the coast. The air liner disappeared with all on board while engaged in the Marseilles-Barcelona service.
