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BUILDING PLAN GAINS SUPPORT IN COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—President Hoover's plan for spending \$150,000,000 within six months on public building projects was started today on the road to legislative enactment, with the first outburst of criticism apparently stifled.

Detailed explanation of his plan, giving the amounts allocated to sub-divisions of the government departments, but not naming the specific projects to be built, was accorded favorable reception at the house appropriations committee hearing on the proposal.

The chief of the public roads bureau and the chief of the army engineers, among whom the bulk of the expenditures are to be made, were the first witnesses on the committee list.

EX-WIVES DOLE AIM IN ANTI-ALIMONY SOCIETY

VIENNA (Sp.)—Unemployment dole for divorced women has been petitioned of the Austrian Minister of Justice by the Vienna League for Men's Rights.

The society, which devotes much of its efforts toward abolishing the burden of alimony which most of its members carry, argues that a housewife's duties constitute a regular trade or profession. Therefore, the petition said, when a woman was deprived of her regular work, she should be placed on the unemployment dole list until she found some other suitable job.

Critics of the move saw in the petition only an attempt to change alimony from a private into a public debt.

HUNTER SAFELY HOME IS KILLED SOON AFTER
