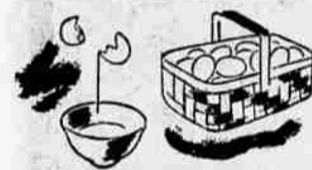

LIQUOR SUSPECT FIGHTS HARD TO BEAT JAIL 'RAP'

Closing arguments in the retrial of Walter Hawley, Ashland, charged with possession of liquor, are expected to start this afternoon, in circuit court, and the case is expected to be in the hands of the jury late today, or early tomorrow morning. The trial is proceeding hectically with arguments between Deputy District Attorney George W. Neilson and Thomas J. Enright, defense counsel. A jury that heard the case last week disagreed.

The principal witness at the morning session was the defendant, who said he was a casual visitor at the quarters of William Johnson, when arrested. He said he was en route from Portland to his Ashland home, when he was visiting with Johnson overnight, at a Riverside avenue apartment. He said he had one of Johnson's shirts, and had known him for two years.

Hawley testified that he knew State Prohibition Officer H. H. Hagan, chief witness for the state, and that he had taken drinks with him at Mrs. Bodine's in Klamath Falls.

TRAVELER INJURED BY FAINT, ASHLAND DEPOT

ASHLAND, Dec. 5.—(Sp.)—Albert Meisner, of St. Louis, Ill., a passenger on train 12, which arrives in Ashland in the early afternoon, was taken to the Ashland hospital to receive treatments for a broken nose, bruises, and two minor cuts on his head. He fell forward after returning to the train from eating lunch at the depot. Attending physicians state the fall was caused by fainting or heart trouble. Mr. Meisner was en route to Reno, Nevada.

CHRISTMAS SEALS AT CHAMBER COMMERCE

Special Recipes December Menus

Chocolate Potato Cake
1 cup shortening
1 1/2 cup sugar
3 eggs, separated
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup Pabst plain malt syrup (light)
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup mashed potatoes
1 cup nut meats
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
3 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 cup cocoa
1 1/2 cup sifted flour
Cream shortening and sugar together. Add beaten yolks, milk, malt syrup and vanilla and mix well. Stir potatoes and nut meats. Add the cloves, cinnamon, baking powder and cocoa to the sifted flour and sift into the first mixture. Stir well. Fold in the three egg whites which have been stiffly beaten. Bake in spring form 350 degrees Fahrenheit from 45 to 50 minutes. Frost with your favorite frosting.

Date Delight
1 package dates
1 teaspoon soda
1 cup hot water
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup sugar
1-3 cup Pabst plain malt syrup (light)
1 egg
1/2 cup nut meats
1/2 cup citron
1 1/2 cups flour
Stone the dates and put them in a bowl and add the soda, salt and hot water. Let this mixture set for several minutes or until cool. Cream the butter and sugar in a mixing bowl. Add the malt syrup and stir until the mixture is smooth. Add beaten egg, nuts, citron and dates to the butter mixture. Sift in the flour. Stir until all ingredients are well mixed. Turn into shallow pan. Bake about 35 minutes in a moderate oven 350 degrees Fahrenheit.

Graham Cracker Torte
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup sugar
3 eggs, separated
1/2 cup Pabst plain malt syrup (light)
1/2 cup milk
22 graham crackers, ground fine
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 cup flour
1 teaspoon vanilla
Cream the sugar and butter well; add the egg yolks and beat. Add malt syrup, beat and stir the milk in last. Mix the ground graham crackers, baking powder and flour; add to the first mixture. Fold in stiffly beaten whites and add the vanilla. Bake in two layers in a moderate oven, 45 to 50 minutes. Use custard or lemon filling. Frosting may be used if desired, or if preferred powdered sugar may be used.

Put all dry ingredients in a mixing bowl. Measure water and heat in pan. Add malt syrup and butter. Stir until it is all dissolved and when cool add to the dry ingredients with the beaten egg. Stir until batter is smooth. Turn into a shallow baking pan and bake about 30 minutes in oven at 350 degrees. Serve hot with butter or jam.

COREY WANTS BIG TELEPHONE PROBE

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 5.—(Sp.)—Contending that the public service commission should not limit to hotel service its proposed investigation into telephone rates, but that the investigation should be general and cover the entire range of service, H. H. Corey, member of the commission, refused to sign the order issued by the commission yesterday.

The order, limiting the inquiry to hotels outside of Portland, was signed by Commissioners Miller and Bartzmeyer.

TALENT FAVORS LIGHT LAW FOR HIGHWAY HIKERS

ASHLAND, Ore., Dec. 5.—(Sp.)—In discussing proposed traffic recommendation legislation to be discussed by the meeting of the captains of the state traffic force at Salem tomorrow, for submission to the coming legislature, Captain C. P. Talent, in charge of the southern Oregon district, says he will compel pedestrians traveling on a highway after dark to "light up" with some sort of lantern. Captain Talent says:

"Pedestrians on the highway after dark are in danger themselves and constitute a real menace to motorists. It is almost impossible to see these hikers walking along the side of the pavement, and frequently minor wrecks are the result of a sudden application of brakes, or the swerving of a car to prevent a more serious accident."

He also called attention to the fact that hitch-hikers on the highway are numerous, many of whom travel at night, and that if "paranormally" lit up, they would constitute less of a menace to traffic.
