PARIS GETS NEW PORT, DWARFING BOURGET FIELD

PARIS, Dec. 2.—Paris is to have a new super-airport—and Le Bourget is out. This famous landing field, was trained by the spectacular arrival of Lindbergh in the dawn of night after his epochal flight from New York, the taking off of Notre-Dame de la Salette, and the return compliment, Paris to Chartres, held, and countless other flights, has been found inadequate.

Created in 1920, ten years later it proves to be too small. The site of an airfield, a mere ten years, is pointed out by airmen, as showing the tremendous strides made by aviation since the war. The new Paris airport, estimated to cost \$23,000,000, is to be located to the west of Paris, along the banks of the Seine. It provides for a runway 1,600 meters long—about a mile and a quarter—in all directions, the cement slabs being pointed in a star shape to all points of the compass, so that planes can always take off facing the wind.
