Unemployed and Efforts Toward Alleviation Held Principal News of Week

To paraphrase Charles A. Dana, "When a man loses his job, that's not news. But when 5,000,000 lose their jobs, that's news." The word that is on every mouth in the United States as the Christmas spending season nears—unemployment—is on the front page of every newspaper in the land.

Efforts are being made to alleviate the stricture on the American throat before it becomes too tight to remedy constitute the biggest piece of news events of the past week in the opinion of Jean Van Dyke, who was adjudged winner in the Mail-Tribune news essay contest sponsored by the Journalism class of the Medford high school. Her essay follows:

Unemployment and the methods of obtaining relief has become one of the most discussed matters in America as well as other countries, and consequently has become one of the leading newspaper subjects at this time.

COURTS REFLECT NOVEMBER QUIET IN ALL BUSINESS

Reflecting the annual November quietness in business and general affairs that has been noted in Medford for years past, in comparison with the activity of most of the other months of the year, city court business last month included only 12 cases and a total of \$115 in fines collected, divided as follows: Six drunks, \$55; one traffic violation, \$5; 1 disorderly conduct case, \$5; one liquor possession case, \$50.

MEDFORD AIRPORT RATES OWN FLAG

The Medford airport, which is owned by the Medford post office, has a special annual port flag. It is a blue and white flag, with a red cross in the center, and the words "U. S. AIRMAIL" are sewn in the center of the flag. The flag was adopted by the federal government last year as the official badge of airmail pilots. It was announced that the flag was to be made available at cost to the 150 airmail pilots of the nation.

ENGLISH CLAIMS MAJOR INTEREST AT HIGH SCHOOL

That more time is spent on the study of English than any other subject in high school is shown in a report of total enrollments in all classes at Medford high school, released by Principal C. G. Smith.

Thirty-two English classes are taught by a corps of nine teachers, in which 824 students enrolled. English is a required subject for all except those who have finished four years of it.

History ranks close behind English with 675 students taking the various courses. Mathematics comes third with 424 and science is a close fourth with 350.

Although called a "dead" language, Latin is taught to 166 students in eight different classes. Modern languages, French and Spanish, have only 149 enrolled.

Of the commercial subjects in Medford high, typing is the most interesting. A total of 184 students are using the 35 typewriters in the school. Bookkeeping comes second with 86 enrollments, which under the new system used in Medford schools must be taken as long as a student is a poor writer, has 18 enrolled.

Physical education proves more popular with boys in high school, although there are more girls in school. There are 292 boys taking that course, to 157 girls.

Manual training work is taken by 95 boys and agriculture by 88, while 145 girls take home economics.

Other classes, with enrollments are as follows: Glee club 57, occupations 56, interpretative reading 8, art 42, commercial arithmetic 31, shorthand 53, choral singing 19, instrumental music 55.

SHOW KELVINATOR IN YULE SETTING

Among the most original and elaborate Christmas window displays in Medford is the frosted Kelvinator arrangement at the Southern Oregon Electric store on East Main street. C. O. Blaine, Kelvinator service expert, who fixed the exhibit, had charge of a similar window at Meier & Frank's store in Portland last year.

In a setting of evergreens, large letter made of quarter inch tubing spell the word Kelvinator. A quarter horse Kelvinator compressor is used in frosting the sign. The display will not be removed until the end of next week.

PLAINTIFF DROPS DAMAGE ACTION

The damage action of \$5000 that has been brought against George Treichler, car dealer, and G. W. Nelson, assistant district attorney, for alleged false arrest of Vernon Cottrell was ordered dismissed in circuit court yesterday on motion of T. J. Enright, counsel for the plaintiff. Cottrell had claimed that his reputation was badly damaged by the alleged false arrest, causing him to be imprisoned at Alturas, Calif.

The arrest resulted from a car deal wherein Treichler claimed Cottrell took a car out of the state without permission, while Cottrell claimed he had no obligation to fulfill to Treichler.
