

CASHIER TRIES TO PARLEY AND BANDIT SLAYS

Well-Dressed Thug Then Flees Pittsburgh Bank—Efficient Chicago Crooks With Machine Guns, Shed No Blood, Get Rich Haul.

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 6.—(AP)—A cashier in a suburban bank was shot and killed today by a robber who escaped with \$1000. The hold-up was the third in the district in 24 hours.

Police of the tri-state district tonight were seeking the bandit who fired on the cashier, Charles N. McFarland, 28, of the Allegheny Valley Trust company, at Verona. A well dressed man entered the bank a few minutes before noon, walked into the cashier's cage and with a drawn revolver told McFarland to "stick 'em up; I mean it."

McFarland, other employees said, turned around and asked "what do you mean?" "I'll show you what I mean," the man with the gun answered, at the same time shooting the cashier, who died instantly.

The bandit took all the bills in sight and fled.

Two holdups occurred yesterday afternoon. One of the places entered was the Pittsburgh Athletic association, where the paymaster was robbed of \$5000. The other establishment was a beverage plant, which lost \$300.

CHICAGO, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Five robbers, armed with machine guns held up the State bank of Clearwater on the south side today. They forced customers and employees to line up against the wall, made the cashier direct them to the vaults and escaped with upwards of \$40,000.

The robbery took place while 12 customers were in the bank. Four men entered the bank, two carrying machine guns and the other two revolvers. The fifth remained in an automobile outside.

Customers and employees were forced to kneel down and place their heads on the floor.

The leader stepped over to Vice President Lambert Bere's desk. "He pointed his machine gun at me," Bere said, "and told me to get into the vault and get the money. One of them followed me. The other ones were going through the cashiers' cages and taking all the currency. They missed \$6000 in one of the cages."

Mrs. Gertrude Camphouse, 23, a bookkeeper, and another woman faint and were left unattended.

The money in canvas sacks, the bandits herded patrons and employees into the basement, warning them to remain there. They walked to the waiting automobile and were lost in the traffic.

Police officers said it was one of the largest and most elaborately planned bank robberies in the vicinity recently.

SOVIET BALKS AT ARMS BAN REPORT

GENEVA, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Soviet Russia today refused to participate in the report which the preparatory disarmament commission will submit to the league of nations along with a draft convention for a future general disarmament conference.

Anatole Lunacharsky, the soviet delegate, labeled the draft convention as "both inadequate and sterile," demanded the right to have all the soviet reservations appended in a separate document and asked that all reference to Russia's views be stricken from the report itself.

He added that as a non-member of the league, the soviet government wished to have nothing to do with a report which it considers strictly negative.

DETROIT COUNTESS WED AMID POMP

VERSAILLES, France, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Countess Ella Matusenka, the former Ella Walker of Detroit, became the bride today of James Hazen Hyde of New York and Paris in one of the most brilliant events of recent French society.

The civil ceremony, required by French law, was performed first at the Versailles city hall, and afterward a religious service was held at Hyde's estate near the chateau of Louis XIV with the Rev. Clayton Williams of Paris officiating.

Andre Tardieu, who was overthrown as premier day before yesterday, was one of the witnesses at the civil ceremony, which was attended by a brilliant gathering of diplomats and French officials.

PARIS, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Destre Ferry, minister of public health, says that 1371 Frenchmen out of every 10,000 pass 50 years of age whereas only 224 Germans, 241 Englishmen and 350 Swedes reach that age.

DANA'S GRANDSON, FAMOUS AND RICH, PERISHES ON HUNT

MARBLEHEAD, Mass., Dec. 6.—(AP)—The body of Duncan Dana, grandson of Charles A. Dana, famous New York editor, was found tonight on Eagle Island bar.

Dana, former Harvard football star and all-American end in 1914 and member of the famous Lafayette escadrille, became the object of search early today when his swamped dory was found. He had been duck hunting, it is believed.

Four fishermen found the body at dusk. It had been washed up on Eagle Island bar, about 500 yards from where the dory was found.

Dana was 46 years old and an electrical engineer. He was graduate at Harvard in 1914 and enlisted in the Lafayette escadrille, numbering among his associates many of the American war aces.

He leaves a widow and three children.

Dana was rated as a millionaire. He was a manufacturer of oil burners and was also known as an inventor.

The Noted Dead

NEWTON, Mass., Dec. 6.—(AP)—The Rev. Dr. William Edwards Huntington, widely known educator and religious leader, died of pneumonia at his home here today at the age of 86. He was Boston university's second president. He was born in Hillsboro, N.H.

He came to the university in 1882 as dean of the college of liberal arts, a post he occupied for 22 years. He was elected president in 1904, an office from which he resigned in 1911 because of failing health. He was then appointed dean of the graduate school, serving from 1911 to 1917. He became president emeritus in 1927.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Col. Andrew Jackson Vining, 55, San Francisco pioneer and leading figure in the grand army of the republic, died here last night. He was a past state president of the Sons of the American Revolution. He served in the Civil war with the 24th Massachusetts regiment.

SEATTLE, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Edward David Cowen, 72, well known newspaperman and a colorful political figure in the state, died here today after a long illness. He started his newspaper career as a printer's devil in Lowell, Mass.

Cowen was city editor of the old Denver Tribune, where he served under Eugene Field, poet and humorist, as editor in the '70s. Later he was city editor of the Chicago News, the London Herald and the Paris edition of the Herald.

SAVE SURVIVORS OF YACHT WRECK ON PACIFIC ISLE

SAN DIEGO, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Rescue of the passengers and crew of the pleasure yacht Eola, wrecked November 30 on the barrier islands 220 miles south of here, was effected today by officers and men of the aircraft carrier Langley, according to a radiogram from that ship received by the commandant of the 11th Naval district.

The Langley, when she sighted the wreckage of the ill-fated pleasure craft, was searching for the San Pedro fishing boat Fidelity, which has been missing for about two weeks.

All passengers and members of the crew of the Eola were rescued and transferred to the destroyer Aaron Ward which also was searching for the Fidelity. The destroyer is expected in port here some time tomorrow.

Those listed in the radiogram as rescued are L. Sayers, master; J. D. Kilkenny, 2307 Wilmington road, Los Angeles, owner; S. F. Frisbee and Anna, Lucille and Hazel Frisbee, Mrs. Mary Johnson, J. M. McPate and H. R. Tiffany, passengers.

The message, as received by the commandant, read:

"While searching shores Guadalupe islands sighted wreck of yacht Eola at northeast coast. All hands saved. Aaron Ward has survivors on board. Yacht wrecked night of November 30. Will send survivors into San Diego when opportunity offers, probably tonight."

COFFEE SUIT FOR MILLION ENDED

OTTUMWA, Iowa, Dec. 6.—(AP) Judge Charles A. Dewey today issued a permanent injunction against Swanson and Gustavson stores preventing it from manufacturing and selling a brand of coffee known as "8 AM. A." coffee.

The injunction dissolved a suit for \$1,000,000 damages filed against the concern by the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea company on October 6, alleging infringement of a trade mark.

No accounting for damages or profits was included in the order issued by Judge Dewey in federal court.

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CHILD SLAYER OF DENVER DENIED SPECIAL RIGHTS

DENVER, Dec. 6.—(AP)—A jury will decide Monday whether Mrs. Pearl O'Loughlin is guilty of the murder of her 10-year-old stepdaughter, Leona.

The contemplated two-day defense of the 31-year-old defendant lasted only a few hours after the state had rested this morning. John M. Keating's announcement as chief of counsel, "The defense rests," came as a distinct surprise in the crowded courtroom.

Mrs. O'Loughlin's counsel then addressed Judge Henley A. Calvert: "With the court's permission we would like to ask at this time we be permitted to place Mrs. O'Loughlin on the stand without being sworn with the stipulation the state not be allowed to cross-examine her."

Keating argued the privilege of taking the stand without being subjected to cross examination was "a common law right," accorded the defendant.

The jury was excluded from the courtroom and arguments offered by both sides. The court then ruled Mrs. O'Loughlin could not take the stand under the prescribed limitations of the defense.

CHICAGO JOBLESS GET FAT BEQUEST FROM 1931 GAME

CHICAGO, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Chicago's jobless were assured a \$100,000 gift today from Northwestern university.

The donation was contingent upon approval by the Big Ten faculty committee on athletics of the transfer of the Northwestern-Notre Dame game of October 18, 1931, from South Bend, Ind., to Soldier Field, the huge lake front arena. This approval, in the interest of charity, was given by the committee today.

Northwestern will take a chance on realizing from extra seating a return of the \$100,000 in the Notre Dame game.

The proposal was made by Northwestern after the committee had refused to permit the teams to play their 1930 renewal at Soldier Field for the benefit of the unemployed. Northwestern then offered \$100,000 to the Illinois unemployment commission provided the 1931 game would be shifted and Notre Dame agreed. Final decision, however, rested with the faculty committee of the Big Ten, which decided that under the circumstances a rule requiring that Big Ten teams play in a stadium operated by schools involved in games, might be set aside, the ac-

tion was the only business transacted by the committee in two protracted sessions.

Youths Enter Pleas
Pleas of guilty were entered in circuit court yesterday by Alvin Miles, Lloyd Kline and Henry Slover on charges of check forgery, for which they were arrested last week by the sheriff's office. The checks were drawn on Central Point and Medford banks. The boys reside in Central Point.

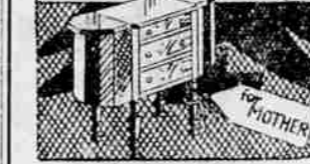
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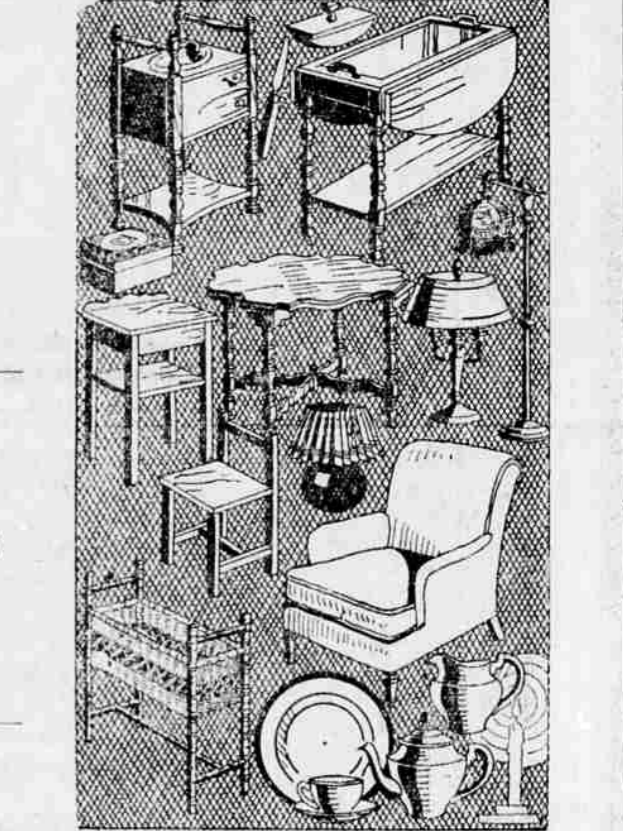
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
