OPINION CLEARS LITIGATION ON POINTER'S WILL

Supreme Court Modifies and Affirms Judge Norton's Decision in Involved Estate.

The supreme court today handed down an opinion in the following Jackson county case as follows: P. K. Nalley, plaintiff and appellant, vs. First National Bank of Medford et al., defendants and respondents; appeal from Jackson county; suit to quiet title. Opinion by Justice Kelley. Decree of Judge H. D. Norton modified and affirmed.

The history of the case is as follows: Pointer, well known locally, in 1904 possessed about \$7,000. He made several unprofitable private loans, and then called upon his son-in-law, P. K. Nalley, and his daughter, Anna C. Nalley, to invest his money. By shrewd investments they brought the amount to \$11,500 by 1917. During the war all loans were called in. After the war, desiring to invest again, he again turned the money over to the Nalleys, and they raised the sum of approximately \$20,000.

After this action, Pointer made another document, leaving one-third of his wealth to Mrs. Nalley, and one-third each to Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Case, and the other half to his daughter, Mrs. Nalley, with the understanding Nalley was to transact his business in the future, the principal to pass to the Nalleys after his death.

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COUNCIL CALLED TO DECIDE UPON SALE OF WATER

At the special meeting tonight, called primarily as a joint gathering with the city water commission to decide on the details of the contract by which the city will sell some of its surplus water supply to the Oak Grove district and which sale was authorized by the voters at the last election, it is probable that action will be taken on some other pending city matters.

One matter that is likely to come up will be the passage of the new anti-noise ordinance, which was given its first reading three weeks ago and was to have been passed last Tuesday's meeting, but was completely overlooked in the stress of the consideration of a mass of business at that time.

This ordinance will regulate, among other things, the barking of dogs at night, etc., and that feature of it is especially aimed at the dog hospital at the end of North Riverside, strenuous objections to which have been made for a long time past by the city officials by residents of the neighborhood.

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BOARD PLANS NEW SCHOOLS OF CONCRETE

Material Will Cost Less Than Brick—Program Set Ahead to Benefit by Present Low Values.

Concrete has been granted preference over brick for construction of the proposed new buildings to take the place of the Washington and junior high schools, according to a decision of the Medford school board. It was announced today.

While there was some personal preference for brick on the part of some people, Supt. E. H. Hedrick stated this morning the school board was unanimous in the feeling that the arguments at this time are distinctly in favor of concrete. "In the first place, the estimates we have from several architects show that concrete construction would cost from 20 per cent to 30 per cent less in Medford at this time," Mr. Hedrick added. "Moreover, Medford has locally the materials for concrete work, but would have to ship in brick from the outside. Since there are very few bricklayers in the city a number of them would also need to be imported if brick were chosen. Again, concrete work permits the employment of a larger amount of labor, especially unskilled."

Set Plans Ahead
The school building program, which involves the sale of the Washington and the junior high school buildings and their replacement by newer, larger and more adequate buildings, had tentatively been set by the board for next summer, but moved by the idea of taking advantage of the present low building costs, and furnishing employment for local labor during the present winter, the program was set ahead a few months.

The election will be held at the junior high school building December 16, from 2 to 7 p. m. To vote in the election one must be 21 years of age, a resident of the district 30 days and a taxpayer or shown by the last assessment, the holder of shares of stock in any corporation or firm which is assessed in the district.
