SEALS OF CHURCH NOT HEALTH FUND
Red and white seals, said to be sponsored by a local religious organization, are not to be confused with the long established tuberculosis Christmas seals that have been on sale here annually for years, the county health department today announced. The department today learned that the seals, with a picture of a church with a white cross in the background and words, "Come to Church," have been purchased by quite a number of local residents under the impression they were the tuberculosis seals.

They are selling for two cents each and are said to have been left here by an outside, private group, which receives 50 per cent of the proceeds.

MAIL YULE GIFTS FOR EAST STATES SOON, IS WARNING

Medford and valley senders of mail are warned by the local post office officials that Christmas mail intended for eastern and middle west destinations, in order to insure the parcels arriving at their destinations in time for delivery Christmas day, must be in the post office not later than Monday, and better still should be mailed on Saturday. Post offices everywhere will be closed all day Christmas day.

Although a few Christmas parcels have been drifting in daily for several days past for distant places as usual the great majority of senders to eastern and middle western points are still delaying, which means that they will all later come practically in a bunch, and contribute to the general Christmas sending and receiving congestion in the postal service, despite the pleas annually of the postoffice service to mail 'em early.
