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SEAL SALES BY CHURCH GROUP ARE EXPLAINED

Argument for the sale of the "Come to Church" seals in Medford for the campaign from the county health department yesterday, was advanced today by J. R. O'Kane, representing the National Church Advancement organization and in charge of the local drive.

Mr. O'Kane said the seals meant to encourage the attendance at all churches, were sold in Medford to financially benefit the Free Methodist church, in need of building improvements.

Mr. O'Kane did not think the sale would conflict with the tuberculosis seal campaign now in progress in Medford, but said the comment of the health department had its damaging effect inasmuch that the campaign had shown a decided decrease today.

Small Fee for Solicitors
There was a small crew of solicitors at work in Medford and were given a small stipend for their efforts, Mr. O'Kane said, in keeping, he pointed out, with similar methods used in other seal campaigns.

A portion of the crew is made up entirely of local people while others travel with Mr. O'Kane from section to section putting on the seal campaigns for some church in need of funds. It just happened, he said, that they arrived in Medford at this time when the tuberculosis seals were being sold.

He said a group of women solicitors received \$1.50 per day for their efforts, with a 50c bonus going to the solicitor selling the most during the day. A woman, Mrs. Sykes, covering the section outside of Medford, received \$1.50 per day, \$2.00 for the use of her car and \$1.00 for gas and oil. Today at noon her car broke down.

Work on Commission
Men solicitors worked on a commission, receiving 25 per cent of their sales—the commission coming out of the 50 per cent of the funds going to the organization. The remaining amount goes to the church.
