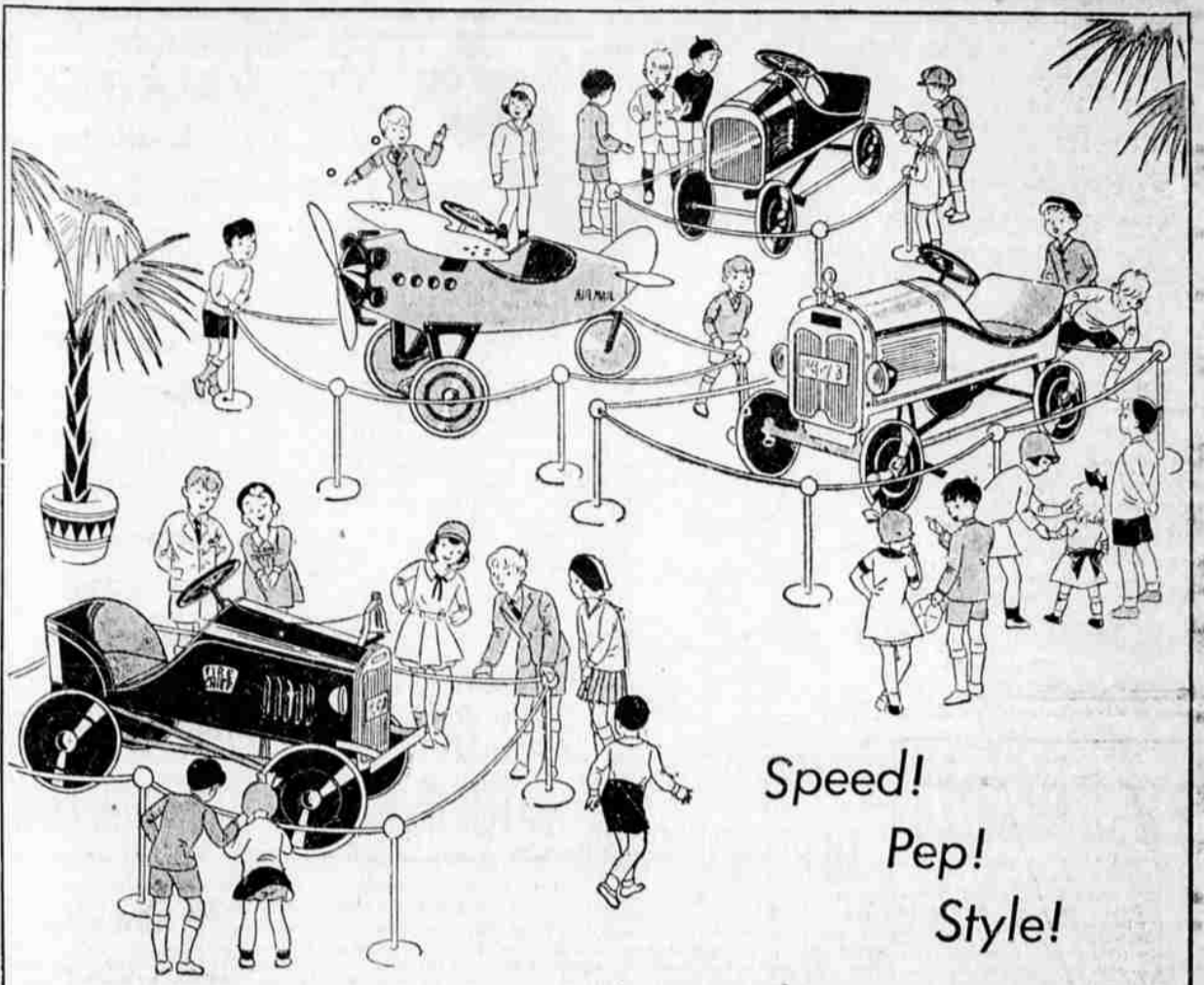
Mrs. Sparrow Outlines History of Dance
