### BOWLES JURY TO VIEW APARTMENT

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 12.—(AP)—Four women and three men, members of the grand jury to which the Bowles murder case is being submitted, left the jury chambers today for a visit to the apartment of Irma Loucks Paris, 28, where Mrs. Leone Bowles, 33, was fatally stabbed last Nov. 12.

Mrs. Paris and Nelson S. Bowles, 34, millionaire, are charged with murder. Mrs. Paris, for three years Bowles' secretary, and the capitalist insist Mrs. Bowles committed suicide when she learned of their affair.

### RASKOB'S SON TAKES 19 YEAR OLD BRIDE

NORTH CHELMSFORD, Mass., Dec. 12.—(AP)—John J. Raskob, Jr., of New York, and Miss Minerva Aaronson of New Haven were married today at the rectory of St. John's Catholic church of North Chelmsford.

Raskob is the son of the John J. Raskob, chairman of the national Democratic committee. He is 23 years old and is employed by a local concern. The bride is 19 years old.

### MARSHFIELD PLANS HELP FOR JOBLESS

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Dec. 12.—(AP)—A plan to co-ordinate all activity for relief of the unemployed and care of Coos Bay's needy was perfected here last night when representatives of all service clubs and civic organizations met. Although unemployment here is not great, the group of citizens is seeking to render aid as a precautionary measure. Henry LeCocq, fire chief, will supervise relief work.

### STEEG WILL ATTEMPT FORM FRENCH CABINET

PARIS, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Theodore Steeg tonight accepted the president's mandate to form a new cabinet succeeding that of Andre Tardieu.

Steeg, a leader of the "left" bloc in the senate, was the fourth man President Doumergue called upon to replace the Tardieu ministry.

BARCELONA, Spain, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Major Ramon Franco, Spain's premier aviator, who escaped from a military prison three weeks ago and has been a fugitive since, is one of the leaders in the military revolt which broke out today in the town of Jaca, the authorities were informed.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 12.—(AP)—Aurora M. Frank was selected today by the Portland realty board as Portland's "first citizen" during 1930.

### 'BLACK MATT' SLAYS PARTNER IN CRIME

KETCHIKAN, Alaska, Dec. 12.—(AP)—"Black Matt" Berkovich, convicted of conspiracy to violate the dry laws, and Phil Dohm, former Seattle man, were dead here today, the victims of murder and suicide.

Berkovich shot Dohm from behind as he left a poolhall and then turned the gun on himself, inflicting a head wound. Both died instantly. Dohm, indicted with Berkovich on the conspiracy charge, turned state's evidence and was not prosecuted.

### I'M NOT SMART, IS NACKER'S DEFENSE

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Dec. 12.—(AP)—Shaping by his own testimony the defense plea of insanity, Donald Nacker, 21, on trial for first degree murder, today declared he had no recollection of having shot and killed Fred Dunbar, Klamath insurance man, at Summit lake last Labor day. Dunbar, in the company of Miss Doris Bacon of Salem, was spending the holiday at the lake.

### LIFE INSURANCE ASSETS GROWING

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Addition of \$1,418,000,000 to assets of life insurance companies in the United States this year, despite business depression, was forecast today by Walton L. Crocker, president of the John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance company, of Boston, before the Association of Life Insurance presidents.

This sum, he said, will bring total investments of the companies to \$18,000,000,000 at the end of the year.

### GAS PRICE BOOST DUE IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Although some retail stations reported today they had notification from wholesale distributors that the price of gasoline will be boosted 2 1/2 cents a gallon within a day or so, managers of wholesale companies today denied knowledge of the reported advance in price.

Motor fuel has been selling at 20 cents a gallon here for the past six weeks, 2 1/2 cents off the "regular" posted price by wholesalers.

### PIONEER BURIED IN STYLE OF FRONTIER

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 12.—(AP)—Before he passed away, W. W. Irvin of Aurora, pioneer, requested that he be buried wrapped in a blanket, like early day frontiersmen, and that Indian boys serve as pallbearers. His request was granted. The funeral was held yesterday.

### AUTHORIZE BONDS ON LAKEVIEW RAILROAD

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 11.—(AP)—The state railroad commission today authorized the California Public Service Co., operating in Mendocino and Alturas areas, to sell \$125,000 of its common capital stock and \$155,000 of first mortgage gold bonds.

### CUBA PLACES BAN ON ALL COMMUNICATION

HAVANA, Dec. 12.—(AP)—The government came down with a censorship on all telegraph lines, cables, telephones and radio stations this afternoon. It was the first indication that President Machado intended to put real force into the suspension of constitutional guarantees, which he ordered yesterday.

### STORM WARNINGS FLY ON NORTHWEST COAST

PORTLAND, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Southeast storm warnings were displayed at all seaports on the coast of Oregon and Washington today. Small craft warnings were flying on Puget Sound.

### HAWLEY ASKS PROBE FOR INDIAN CLAIMS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—(AP)—The court of claims would be authorized to determine claims of Indians in Oregon by a bill introduced today by Representative Hawley, Republican, Oregon.

He also presented measures to authorize appropriation of \$300,000 for the construction of a road through the Umpqua national forest between Steamboat Bridge and Black Steam, Oregon.
