HAWLEY CHANGES MOONSHINE PLEA

After juries had failed to agree in two trials on moonshine possession charges, Walter Hawley, Ashland, changed his plea of not guilty to guilty in circuit court yesterday and was sentenced to 70 days in the county jail. Joe Hardesty, arrested on a moonshine charge about the same time, also pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 70 days.

In passing sentence Circuit Judge Norton told Hawley he had caused the county considerable expense in the past two trials when juries disagreed despite "conclusive evidence" of his guilt.
