Attractive Surroundings Keep Boy At Home



Mother Lets Son Decorate Own Room

IF the boy of the house does not feel "at home", it is almost impossible to keep him there. He will spend his time in more congenial, perhaps less wholesome, places, and as soon as he can he will leave home for good.

One mother kept her son out of the loafing places of a town by encouraging him to paint his bedroom. He had been going with the town's worst young toughs. He had kept late hours and refused to explain where he had been or what he had been doing. Scolding and punishment proved ineffectual.

The mother worried for months and then met the situation squarely. The home, she realized, offered little in attraction or amusement to keep him at home. The downstairs rooms were designed for the comfort of the parents and their guests. There was no place for the boy there. His bed room was suitable for sleeping, and did well enough as a place in which to keep his clothes and store his books and playthings.

Nothing more could be said in favor of the room. The walls were covered with paper left over from the mother's room; it was a pink rosebud pattern that formed an almost ludicrous background for a shelf of boyish knickknacks and possessions. Boxing gloves, an Indian hammer head, a hockey stick, a steam engine and a pair of deer horns—now that she looked about critically—seemed to have wandered by mistake into the pink papered room. The curtains, lampshade and rug had aged under former service in the dining room and living room.

Judge Lindsey Old-Fashioned

"Our young people of today are, as a rule, wholesome, sane and sensible," states Judge Ben F. Lindsey in the January College Humor, discussing "Sex and the College Student."

"If given half a chance, they will inaugurate a moral age, the best yet known in history. They are trying to accommodate their lives to things as they are. They want to approach experience with less hypocrisy and more honesty. Frankly, they are emmeshed in economic and social conditions in the making of which they had no part. What they are going to do about it they do not yet quite know, but that they will find a way out in line with happiness and a sound morality is highly probable. There are some of the conclusions I reached in a recent tour of American college communities, during which I lectured before liberal groups both on and off the campus, on the problems of love and marriage.

"In the discussion of these questions I found girls on the whole much keener and franker than the boys. They were, I should say, more honestly inquisitive and concerned over the future of marriage and morals. At an exceptionally illuminating discussion at Chicago university, one of the girls said to me: 'I think your program for the companionate marriage is wonderful. I want to get married,' she confessed, 'just as soon as possible after I leave college. But until I understand what you meant by companionate marriage, I was

afraid that would not be very soon. Oh, yes—I would like to be a mother some day, but neither my fiancé nor myself feel that we can afford that expense for quite awhile. And I think you are absolutely right when you say that a girl should be as much the master of her sex as a boy.

"She should have her love life with the certainty that it will not result in parenthood until she is ready for it. And then after a moment's silence, touched by a moment's silence, she added, 'How much better it would be for us both not to be tied up with a child or children if we should find out that, after all, we were not suited to each other.'

"What she had said seemed to me to be sensible and I commended her adding, however, my view that the companionate relationship of which she was so strong an advocate might much better be in lawful marriage than in liaison. Whereupon a brilliant young girl in the group burst out: 'But say what you will and be as conventional as you please, you know well enough that the judge is right when he says most boys don't get married until after they are thirty. And if that is interfering with my love life, I think I have just as much right to have that love life out of wedlock as in wedlock.'

"For a moment I was dazed. Was I, after all, a bit old-fashioned in standing for a legal, conventional marriage as a preliminary for any sex relationship?"
