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Medford Homes Will Be Brilliantly Lighted To Greet The Beautiful Yuletide Season

The Medford Garden club is sponsoring Medford's third annual Christmas lighting contest this year and arranging for some attractive prizes for the most effective local displays. Rules of the contest are expected to follow about the same lines as former contests and will be announced at an early date. Much interest is being shown in this year's outdoor lighting program and a large number of local citizens are already planning appropriate holiday displays.

So captivating is the result of exterior lighting that it is hard to believe it can be so easily accomplished. The little lights with their gaily colored bulbs come already strung and ready to be hung wherever one's fancy directs. They are sturdy little devices, too, and can be tucked away and used again year after year for Christmas as well as for lawn parties, table decorations and other purposes.

There is a type that burns steadily, or another type where the lights flash on and off. The bulbs are of very low wattage and so consume only a very little electricity.
For those who are somewhat in doubt just how to proceed with their outdoor lighting effects, the following suggestions are offered:
Substitute a red lamp for the customary one in your entrance fixture and put a wreath around it.
Place electric candles in Christmas wreaths in your windows. (Electric candles are far safer than the wax variety.)
Run colored lights through the trees and shrubbery on your grounds.
Place Christmas trees in tubs in

the yard and trim them with strings of colored lights.
Run strings of colored lights along your veranda.
Festoon strings of colored lights along the eaves of your house.
Place colored lights in your flower boxes.
Twine colored lights in wreaths or garlands and hang them in the windows or festoon them about the outside of the house.
Place illuminated stars over the doors or on the roof of your house.
Illuminate your Christmas trees, both those used indoors and those in the yard, with strings of tiny electric lights.
Place colored lights, one red and one green, in twin sockets and place them in the windows.
Hang illuminated Christmas balls in the entry or in the windows.
