

ALABAMA SOPH TO LEAD TIDE IN ROSE BOWL

John Cain, Young Recruit, Can Kick and Pass With Best—Roster Includes Many Stars.

TUSCALOOSA, Ala., Dec. 16.—(AP)—A young sophomore recruit—John "Burry" Cain—will direct Alabama's attack in its Rose Bowl game with Washington State at Pasadena, Calif., on New Year's day.

Cain is an accurate as well as distance kicker, and is said to be the best punter 'Bama has had since the days of Grant Gillis. Although a southpaw, he can pass with either hand and while he hasn't the mature quarterbacking judgment of the seniors, Hubert and Barnes, he has the fire of youth and thus far fortune has smiled on his choice of plays at critical moments.

Many Stars Listed

In addition to Cain, the 1930 Crimson tide lists John Suther, the Flying Dutchman; Monk Campbell spinning ace, and Ralph McWright blocking automaton, in the backfield; and Freddie Simpson, all-American, and Clements at tackle; Moore and Elmore, ends; Miller and Howards, guards; Sherdt, center.

Capt. Wade plans to finish off his training Thursday and will entrain with 35 players Friday for Pasadena, arriving there December 23 after making a short stop at Grand Canyon. There will be no work for the team en route.

PULLMAN, Wash., Dec. 16.—(AP) Coach O. E. Hollingbery of the Washington State college football team today planned to start south two days earlier than he originally planned so Californians can see his team in action before the New Year's day game with Alabama at Pasadena.

"Because of insistent pressure from California fans who want to see the Cougars practice as soon as possible," Hollingbery said, "our traveling schedule has been changed so we will leave Portland for Pasadena, Dec. 22, so we can arrive Dec. 24."

Down in the Gold Beach country, at the mouth of the Rogue river, there never was less poaching than at the present, reported F. M. Brown, deputy game warden, when in Medford today from Curry county, where he has been on duty for the past several months. He reported that recently commercial fishermen of the section held a meeting and passed a resolution unanimously to strictly observe the closed season and under no circumstances was a net to be allowed in the river water. This action is interpreted by local anglers as being a gesture expected to have some influence on the legislature when it meets next January. At that time the closing of the river to commercial interests will be considered and is expected to pass. The 50 or 60 commercial anglers at the mouth of the river feel that such will be the case, and already plans are being made, if such action is taken, to make the closing a matter of referendum. They feel two more years of fishing will be far better than having the river closed at once.

Last year, and the year before, deputy game wardens were kept busy running down reports of alleged poachers and the river was reported to be filled with their activities after the arrival of dusk. They were hard to catch and their work did much to damage angling in the upper reaches of the stream. These fishermen went about their poaching with the spirit of "the public be damned." However, this year realization began to come to them, that after all they were damaging themselves as much as the river. When the initiative measure was proposed to close the river by constitutional amendment, and it has not been resumed as long as the closing of the stream is so imminent. Conditions have so changed that two deputy wardens that had been on duty at the mouth have been removed for the present, leaving three still on duty.

The fishermen have a feeling of bitterness for this section of the state, but that feeling is not declared to be confined to all of Curry county, as shown by the November election when several hundred votes were cast favoring the closing of the Rogue. Quite a number of business men of the section are said to favor the closing, in view of the greater attraction for tourists the section would have. Quite a number of the fishermen have their small farms, raise poultry, cows and other livestock and do not entirely depend on the river for a livelihood, but others fish during the summer and live during the winter on their summer's earnings.

CHICAGO CUEMAN BURNS UP BAIZE IN POCKET PLAY

NEW YORK, Dec. 16.—(AP)—If anyone is to stop the triumphant parade of Erwin Rudolph through the field in the world's championship billiards tournament, apparently it will have to be Ralph Greenleaf, the defending titleholder.

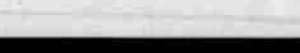

SHARP TEETH IN NEW FISH CODE FOR POACHERS

Provides for Confiscation of Boats and Trucks—Search Warrants and Tight Rules Embodied.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Dec. 16.—(AP)—The power of confiscating property, including boats and trucks, used in illegal taking and transporting of fish, is one of the features of the new fish code released here today by L. A. Liljeqvist, assistant state attorney-general and author of the re-draft of the game code. The re-draft was made under the direction of M. T. Hoy, master fish warden, and A. M. Fish, chief of law enforcement of the state game commission.

Power of Search Given

Other changes under the new code include the power to issue search warrants to cover motor vehicles, stringent regulations regarding netting, making unlawful the sale of food fish purporting to be troll-caught in the Pacific ocean but which carry net marks, making it unlawful to throw back undersized trout or other fish, thus compelling such fish to be kept as a part of the bag limit, and heavier fines with jail sentences imposed for infractions.

The re-drafted code will go before sportsmen's and commercial fishermen's organizations and district attorneys over the state before submitted to the state legislature.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 16.—(AP) The Vancouver Lions once again are on top of the Pacific Coast Hockey league scramble. By defeating Portland 2 to 1 at the arena here last night, the locals broke a three-way tie for first place between themselves, Portland and Seattle.

Alabama's "Tide" Will Get Third Chance Wash Down West Coast's Gridiron Edge



Capt. "Foots" Clement, Alabama tackle, and Capt. "Elmer the Great" Schwartz, Washington State college fullback, will lead their football forces together in the annual Rose Bowl battle New Year's day at Pasadena, California.

PASADENA, Cal.—(AP) For the third time Alabama's Crimson Tide will invade the far west to struggle for football supremacy against a Pacific coast team in the annual Tournament of Roses game New Year's day.

As things now stand the west has a total of 194 points while the east's total is 123. The west has won seven games, the east five and three of the contests were tied, Alabama figuring in one of the tie-up games. In touchdowns the west leads, 27 to 18.

Since the inauguration of the New Year's games southern football teams have never lost to the coast defenders, although Alabama and Stanford tied 7 to 7 in 1927 after having defeated Washington

by a one point margin, 20-19, in 1926.

Georgia Tech won its game in 1929 by a one point lead of 8 to 7 against California. The largest score in the history of the Rose Bowl games was 1930 when Southern California bowled over Pittsburgh, 47-14. In 1918 and 1919 service teams played and split even.
