Examinations for state teachers certificates will be held at Medford commencing at nine o'clock Wednesday and continuing until 4 p. m. Saturday.

Applicants must present themselves for the examinations they wish to take at the time set for the question envelopes to be opened, as the examinations cannot be offered at any other time or place.

Rules and regulations regarding the examinations will be read at 9 a. m. Wednesday. Those entering later in the week and wishing to take only a few of the examinations should present themselves at the secretary's desk for registration and for information regarding the rules. The eleven subjects required for a one year elementary certificate are capitalized in the program.
