

COUGAR COACH UNWORRIED BY UNDER DOG TAG

Men Showing Improvement in Practice Says Washington State Mentor—Subs Show Ability.

PULLMAN, Wash., Dec. 18.—(AP) If the Washington State Cougars are being judged the underdogs for their clash with Alabama's Crimson tide at Pasadena New Year's day it doesn't seem to bother Coach O. E. Hollingbery.

"So far this week," the Cougar mentor said, "the men have been showing marked improvement over any practice of the past two months, and I hope this is an indication the team is finding itself and gathering the polish and finesse necessary to a smooth running offense."

Subs Show Ability

"Several men have shown up exceptionally well in the past two weeks' work, notable among them being Wallulis, the sophomore tackle, who filled in quite well for Edwards at Villa Nova.

"It is probable that if Edwards does not show marked improvement in physical condition, Wallulis will have improved sufficiently to crowd him off the starting lineup. Morgan has been given intensive scrimmage at center this week as it might be necessary to use him considerably at Pasadena. I am sure that if given the opportunity he will prove a pleasant surprise to Cougar fans.

Hill, Hansen Drilled

"I have been working Hill and Hansen at ends, for they are of the smashing type that fits in so well against teams of Alabama's offensive style.

"Now that we are going to leave for Pasadena Friday night, I intend to drive the squad doubly hard in order to crowd in enough real hard work to last us until January 1."

"I want the team to be in perfect physical condition when we step on the train, as the final 10 days in the month will be spent with work designed to keep the men in tip top shape and in eliminating all possible injuries."

With Rod and Gun



Jim Watkins, southern Oregon old-timer, was in reminiscent mood again yesterday and told of the killing of what he says was the last grizzly bear in Jackson county. It met death at the hands of William Beale and Arthur Nichols, near Mt. Pitt in the spring of 1892, so Beale and Jasper Tungate went hunting for deer on Willow prairie, and Juniper ridge, six miles west of Mt. Pitt. They were on horseback and had two dogs with them, when Beale looked ahead and saw the grizzly.

"The bear was about 300 yards away," said Jim in recounting the story. "So Beale told Tungate to stay there with the horses and the dogs. Beale slipped up to within 100 yards of the grizzly when the bear started to run. Beale fired the old 45-70 Springfield rifle, hitting the bear in the left foreleg. This started him bleeding, and made it easy to follow in the snow. The dogs couldn't stop him, so they turned back, as Tungate was a boy of only 10 or 12 years. As soon as they found Art Nichols, who also had some dogs, he and Beale started out after the bear, while Tungate stayed at Nichols' place. The old grizzly made for Mt. Pitt and there the boys and the dogs routed him out. The bear started for Cat Hill, and every little bit Mr. Bear would stop to rest. When the boys got near him, he would move on again.

"The dogs couldn't do anything with him, and the boys didn't dare shoot for fear of hitting one of the dogs. Finally, the boys came up on the bear, lying down. Beale and Nichols slipped up to within 10 feet, and both fired at the grizzly's head. He rolled over, gasped and died. Just as he took his last breath, one of the dogs slipped into the bear's jaws and received a crushed leg and shoulder for his foolishness. The boys had traveled 12 miles before the grizzly gave up, and by that time it was getting late in the evening. The next day they went back with a wagon and drove within two miles of the bear. They used pack horses to bring the meat to the wagon. The stockmen gave the boys \$100 for killing the grizzly and they sold the hide for \$50, including the sale of the lard and meat. They received nearly \$200 for their trouble. The bear weighed 1400 pounds.

"After he was skinned," Jim continued, "one of the boys asked me to pick up the hide, but it was so heavy I couldn't lift it. The fur was eight to ten inches long, and the body had dozens of black powder bullets in it. Since Beale and Tungate were my nephews, I got some of the meat."

Jim was once a sheepherder and recalled trouble with coyotes. "One day I had the sheep on what we called the Reese desert," he said, "and they were watched carefully to keep the coyotes off. I saw a coyote slipping along toward the sheep. Whenever they saw him, they would stop eating and watch him. The coyote would also remain quiet. The sheep fed all around the variant and I jumped on my horse and into the herd I went. I saw the coyote make a grab at one. I cut loose with my gun and fired six shots in less time than it takes to tell. I killed three sheep, but never touched the coyote. He made a quick escape and I got good and mad. I dragged the sheep into some brush and I guess the bones are still there. The next morning I hid behind a blind and soon saw two coyotes. I fired the gun and killed both with the same bullet. I killed some more later and the sheep were not bothered again for sometime."

ROCKNE UNDERGOING SURVEY IN HOSPITAL

ROCHESTER, Minn., Dec. 18.—(AP) Knute Rockne, master thinker of Notre Dame football, was at Mayo brothers clinic today for a checkup and overhauling made necessary by the strain of the Irish drive to the 1929 national gridiron title.

Rockne was here a year ago for treatment of a leg infection which kept him inactive physically until last spring. He plans to go to a southern resort early in January for a long rest.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 18.—(AP) Four deputy game wardens of the Oregon state game commission were relieved of duties yesterday by Arthur M. Fish, law enforcement chief, in a campaign to reduce departmental expenses. Two were staff officers and the other two were assigned with special commissions.

The regular officers were E. A. Joyner, Oregon City, stationed on the Rogue river patrol, and C. W. Bratcher, at McMinnville. James Inlath, special deputy in charge of the Nestucca river patrol, and E. A. Jackson, special deputy on West lake and Siltcoos lake, completed the list.

Everett Meads, in charge of the Nestucca patrol, was shifted to Yamhill county, and Charles Dilig, Portland, was transferred to the Nestucca river, Frank C. Stellmache, will superintend law enforcement in Douglas and Lane counties.

NOTED RIDER OF MAN O' WAR DIES

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Clarence J. Kummer, 31, noted jockey who rode Man o' War to many victories, died today at his home in Jamaica, Queens. He had been ill for several days with pneumonia.

In 1929 Man o' War won 11 races and Kummer was in the saddle in nine of them. Starting his career 15 years ago as a lad of 16, he rode some of the best horses in the country, winning almost all of the important prizes except the Kentucky derby and Belmont steeplechase.
