

MODERN IDEAS WILL FEATURE NEW HI SCHOOL

Two-Story Structure Described By School Heads—Athletic Accommodations Compact.

Two stories of concrete, situated 200 feet back from Oakdale, with oak trees and possibly a private driveway in front. Such is the picture of the new high school building which will be erected this winter and spring, as planned by Superintendent E. H. Hedrick and Principal C. G. Smith, who have been working on the plans for some time.

Inside the \$210,000 structure will incorporate many of the latest ideas in school arrangement and equipment. Each room will be wired for radio, should the school adopt such a system. Two gymnasiums, a larger one for scholastic games and a smaller for girls, will be on the ground floor.

Includes Gridiron

The football field will be directly behind the school and will have larger bleachers and grandstand than the present Van Scoyoc field.

An auditorium which will seat 1200 persons will be located on the wing opposite the gymnasium. The general shape of the school plant will be that of a letter "E".

Other new features of the building, which will be ready for occupancy in September, will be a public speaking room with a small stage, improved athletic dressing rooms for both home and visiting teams, lockers for students' books and coats set into the corridor walls instead of standing in the halls.

These corridors will be three feet wider than those in the present high school, with a wider ramp or incline between floors.

Uni-Vent Healthy

The heating system operates in each room individually. It is known as the "uni-vent" system and works with a thermostat so that heat is turned on or off when the temperature reaches a certain point.

Shop and agriculture classes will be housed in units of their own but connected with the main building. All laboratories, the library and such classes as bookkeeping, typing, shorthand and English will be handled on the second floor.

The main gymnasium will be 100 feet by 100, with a playing space of about 50 by 50 feet and room to seat 1000 spectators. High school games can be played here instead of at the armory and will result in saving of considerable money spent each year for rental purposes.

DE PALMA'S WIFE WEEPS IN COURT

Mrs. De Palma broke down when her husband informed the court he would not return to her. She recently sued for separate maintenance, charging desertion and declaring "he forced me to do this with a request that I give him his freedom."

ADMIRAL BYRD TO LECTURE HERE ON SOUTH POLE TRIP

One of the remarkable features of the Byrd Antarctic expedition is the fact that upon an expedition of so unusual a size and on so hazardous a mission not a man was lost. This was due to the foresight, vision and efficiency of Admiral Byrd himself, who is to tell his own story of Little America at the Holly theater, Medford, Saturday, January 17, under auspices of the American Legion.

It was the careful planning of their leader who thought out in advance every step that was taken and prepared for every emergency, that insured the safety of the men. The expedition comprised 60 men all told. Of these 42 wintered in the Antarctic. Two vessels transported the party and its equipment to the Antarctic.

Here began the two years work of exploration which culminated in the magnificent flight to the south pole from which Byrd returned to Little America on November 29, 1929, the conqueror of both the south and the north poles.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC TO ACQUIRE TEXAS ROAD

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—(P)—Acquisition of the Gulf and West Texas railroad by the Southern Pacific was authorized today by the Interstate Commerce commission.

The Southern Pacific was authorized to acquire the capital stock of the Gulf and West Texas and the latter was permitted to issue \$200,000 of common stock with a par value of \$100 a share to be used in constructing proposed new line.


ROCKEFELLERS GIVE FUNDS FOR JOBLESS
