TWO DAYS MORE FOR PURCHASING HEALTH STAMPS

For two days more Christmas seals will be on sale at the booths located in the postoffice and the Medford Furniture and Hardware company. Health association officials urge the public to buy to the fullest extent. While the response has been generous, a further effort must be made to complete the quota for Jackson county, they report.

Since 1928, the Christmas seal has been an annual institution in the United States, and the funds raised through this source, an annual contribution to the fight against tuberculosis. During this time, the National Tuberculosis association, with its state affiliations, has accomplished extensive preventive work, and the death rate has been reduced 60 per cent. Always increasing cooperation on the part of the public is essential to the success of this undertaking.

"Because the money given to buy Christmas seals is put to work right here in our own county to protect and improve the health of our own people, especially the children, everyone should buy just as many as possible," said Mrs. R. E. Greene yesterday in appealing for more and larger purchases of the seals.

"The generous response of hundreds of Jackson county people who have already bought in most quantities, and in behalf of the Jackson County Health association I want to thank them for their support. Many people have been very generous—more even than last year."

"No attempt has been made to tell people how many seals they should buy," Mrs. Greene said. "Any amount is gratefully accepted— even a few pennies. Everyone knows the money goes for a good cause and gives according to his ability and interest in the work. If everyone could see the health giving service made possible by his gift our goal would be reached by night."

BEEKMAN ESSAY CONTEST THEME IN 1931 NAMED

"The Oregon Trail" will be the subject for the 1931 C. C. Beekman essay contest, according to a recent announcement of the Oregon Historical society. This contest, carried on in the schools of the state each year with the endorsement of the state department of education, carries with it recognition ranging from \$50 to \$200, including bronze medals.

Honorable mention, for which each person received a copy of "History of the Oregon Constitution," by Charles Henry Carey, included Peggy Gullens, St. Helens high school, St. Helens; Grace Elizabeth Heals, Corvallis high school, Corvallis; Thornton Call, Franklin high school, Portland.

LABOR PROSPECTS BRIGHTEN AS NEW PROJECTS START

With state, county, and city agencies in action, the unemployment situation in this city and Jackson county is scheduled to brighten shortly after the first of the year. The usual labor lull before spring orchard work starts is expected to be eliminated.

The state highway commission is employing 25 men at present on improvement and widening of the Pacific and Crater Lake highways. There have been over 200 local men registered for this work. The neediest are employed first, and it will be the policy to rotate the applicants giving all a chance to earn a few dollars. Only married men, or men with dependents, and bona fide residents of Jackson county or this city are employed.

Starting of work on the new school buildings, will also furnish labor, and it will also be home workers, exclusively, and, as far as possible, the material will be purchased from local firms.

The city will also do public work, particularly the Cottage street bridge over Bear creek. The county will operate two gravel crushers, and avoid laying off a dozen or so men.

YULE LIGHTS TO BEAUTIFY CITY

Many new displays of holiday lighting are to be installed here over the week-end according to report and this city will present a beautiful appearance for Christmas and New Year.
