TURKEYS WEAKEN ON MARKET GLUT, EGGS IN ADVANCE

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 24.—(AP) Portland wholesale turkey market opened today under a weaker tone as result of an overload of supplies which reached the market Tuesday afternoon. Prices to producers were mixed and generally lower on heavy and light sizes of which retail shops were well supplied for the Christmas trade. No. 1 birds in the weight extremes moved to retailers at from 29 to 31 cents on a light early demand, but demand for scarce holdings of 11 to 12 pound birds was active at 31 to 33 cents. It appeared that part of the lighter and heavier supplies may be carried over the holiday in receivers stores. Quotations to producers on old toms and No. 2 stock ranged from 23 to 25 cents with demand light and spotted.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 24.—(AP) Wholesale egg quotations opened 3 cents higher today on extra and standard and 2 cents up on medium as result of better local demand and advancing eastern prices. Quote: Extras 23 cents; standards 21c; mediums 18c, and pullets unchanged at 18c. Butter market was barely steady with receipts ample and sales limited.
