PRODUCE MARTS UNCHANGED FOR WEEK'S OPENING

PORTLAND, Dec. 29. — (AP) — Wholesale butter and egg quotations opened unchanged today. Early demand was good for both. Butter receipts were strong and egg receipts ample. Heavy butter receipts of the last week totaled 80,250 pounds, compared with 82,364 pounds the previous week and 65,928 pounds the same week last year. Storage holdings were down to 64,760 pounds as against 106,734 pounds a year ago. Egg storage amounted to 9476 cases as against only 186 cases in the same week last year. Fresh country veal continued in light supply and was quoted 5 cent higher, 15 cents a pound. Other dressed meats were firm. Light demand for turkeys and geese following the Christmas peak trade brought lower quotations on the wholesale street today; turkeys, 1 to 2 cents; ducks, 3 to 4 cents. Quoted, alive: No. 1 turkeys, 29 to 31 cents; prime ducks, 17 to 18 cents a pound. Poultry, geese, firm, without advance counting a 2 cent advance for light hens, but a smaller top price spread.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 29. — (AP) — A diminutive Los Angeles aviator, Juanita Burns, claimed a new official world's altitude record for women today, as a result of a three hour flight yesterday in which she claimed she reached a height of approximately 28,500 feet. The woman flyer said she climbed for half an hour after the last of her three attempts, stopped functioning at 27,000 feet.
