NEW GUATEMALA REIGN DISLIKER
WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—(AP)—The American legation at Guatemala city on instructions of the state department has informed the Guatemalan government the United States will not recognize the regime of President Orellana. Department officials refused to comment. It was said on high authority, however, that the disinclination to extend recognition to Guatemala was based on the terms of the treaty of 1923 which set forth the conditions under which new regimes in Central America may be recognized.
