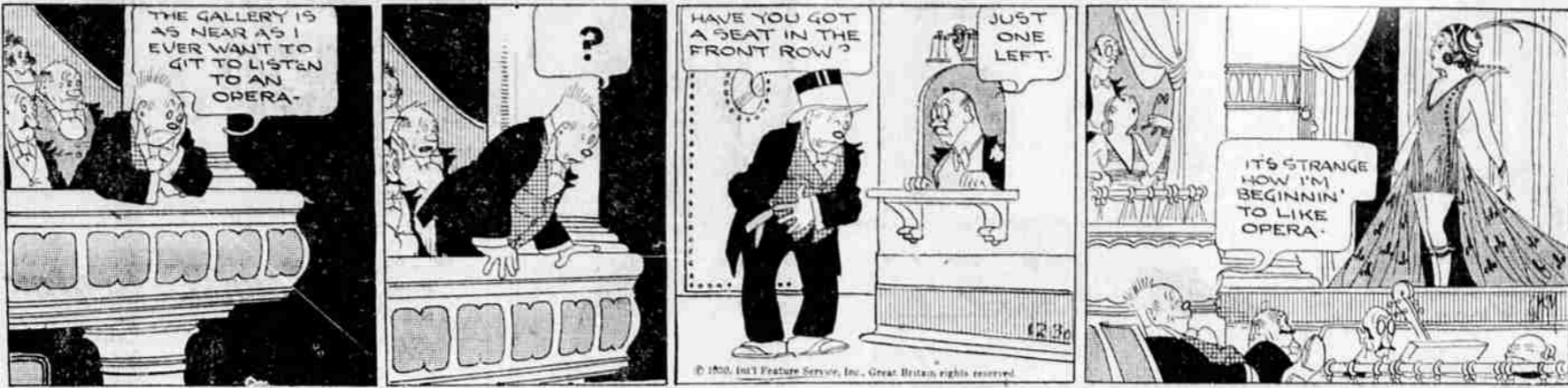

EIGHT CHINESE PERISH IN WRECK

SHANGHAI, China, Dec. 30.—(AP) Eighty persons were killed and 40 injured Saturday in the derailment of a train by bandits on a branch line of the Peking-Mukden railway in southwest Manchuria. The bandits removed fishplates on the ties. The bursting of a locomotive boiler started a fire which was fed by gasoline in one of the cars and several coaches were destroyed, burning many passengers to death.

MAJOR SHEPARD ASKS NEW MURDER HEARING

TOPEKA, Kan., Dec. 30.—(AP) Motions for a new trial and arrest of judgment were filed with the clerk of the federal district court here today in behalf of Major Charles A. Shepard, army medical corps officer stationed at Denver who was convicted by a jury eight days ago of the poison murder of his second wife at Fort Riley, Kan., in June, 1929.

SALEM FIREMEN BUSY DURING COLD PERIOD

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 30.—(AP) The present cold snap is keeping both the police and the fire departments unusually busy here. Overheated furnaces are resulting in frequent fire alarms and numerous reports of the theft of clothing and blankets from automobiles are made to headquarters. GERMANY GAINING BUSINESS GROUND IN HARBIN REGION

HARBIN, Manchuria.—(AP)—Germany's attempt to get a commercial foothold in this part of Asia is bearing fruit. Despite heavy competition from American, British and Japanese interests, the German campaign has made progress and new German agencies are being opened in Harbin and Mukden, leading trade centers of the region. The initial success of the business venture is largely a result of contacts made last summer by the German industrial mission to China. Members of the mission spent nearly two months in Manchuria and not only made contacts for the development of business, but signed contracts for delivery of goods that they were able to sell themselves. They were particularly successful in selling railroad supplies to Manchurian lines now under construction by Chinese interests. It is reported the mission arranged to finance construction of new railways tapping the interior of Manchuria provided the rolling stock is bought from Germany.

ADANA, Turkey.—(AP)—The old cry of "Fear Allah" has been raised in New Turkey for the first time in eight years of the Kemalist regime. The ban who utters it is Abdul Kadir Kemal Bey, early political opponent of Mustafa Kemal, whose life and liberty were saved by that same Mustafa Kemal when the Turkish tekkehs were after him. Despite the catastrophe to Fethi Bey's liberal party, Kemal Bey is keeping alive the small opposition "party of the population" which he formed in Adana, politically restive center of Turkey's cotton production.
