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STATE JEALOUS IN RELEASE OF KLAMATH RIGHT

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 3.—(AP)—Should the federal bureau of reclamation grant a release for private appropriation of the waters of Klamath river, the state would be issued to the release and not to the California-Oregon Power company or any other private or corporate interest, said a telegram received by State Engineer Stricklin today from George Otis Smith, chairman of the federal power commission at Washington. It is believed the telegram was sent after a conference between Smith and the reclamation bureau. The information is not interpreted as an intimation that the release is to be issued prior to legislative developments in Oregon.

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ONE-EYED AUTOS WILL BE TARGET IN TRAFFIC CHECK

State Traffic Captain C. P. Talbot returned yesterday from Salem, where he attended a session of traffic captains from all parts of the state in connection with a discussion on auto headlights. Particular stress was laid on those motor cars which persist in faring forth at night with only one light or without tailights. A constant check is to be kept by officers on these motor vehicles in an effort to make the highways of the state safer for driving at night. "The percentage of cars with bad lights is reasonably low, Captain Talbot said today, and in some cases there are legitimate excuses. Often motorists, upon leaving their homes are equipped with good lights, but encounter trouble when on the road, and others forget to look at their tailights. In such cases, the drivers usually have the trouble repaired as soon as possible, but some drivers are charged with willfully driving at night with poor lights and these motorists will receive particular attention from traffic officers."

JURY PONDERING MATTHEWS FATE

The case of Raleigh Matthews, Eagle Point, charged with sale of moonshine, went to the jury this forenoon at 10:20 and no verdict had been reached this afternoon. Opinion around the court house indicated a hung jury with the probability the jury will still be out this evening. The alleged sale is said to have taken place some time ago and the state claimed the sale was made to a prohibition officer. The defendant claims he was a guest at a neighbor's house during the time the sale is alleged to have taken place. A civil action is to be tried in circuit court next week as the next case on the docket.
