RIOTS MARK 'ALL QUIET' MOVIE IN VIENNA SHOWING. VIENNA, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Rioting marked the opening tonight of the first Vienna showing of the American motion picture "All Quiet on the Western Front."

Fascists blocked the entrances before the screening started and when police attempted to clear the approaches one officer received a serious head wound.

Further trouble developed inside the theatre where Fascists flung tear gas bombs and thus necessitated the firing of the place before the performance started.

Eventually the police threw strong lines around the area to subdue demonstrators who threatened to storm the theatre.

The film, produced in Hollywood from a book written by a German author, shows the life of the German common soldier during the world war.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 3.—(AP)—The executive board of the Oregon state federation of labor here today adopted the legislative program formed at the annual convention of the federation last October in Medford.

Ben T. Osborne, executive secretary of the federation, said the organization would seek modification of the eight-hour law for laborers so that its provisions will include those working for the state highway commission.

The federation, he said, will seek an amendment to the small loan law; free textbooks; old age pension; enactment of the federal child labor amendment; restriction of injunctions in labor controversies; and amendment giving the labor commissioner more power in wage troubles; and abolition of the "yellow dog" contract system.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 2.—(AP)—The sum of \$250,000 for a sweeping investigation of telephone rates in the state is proposed in legislation requested by the Oregon Club, Inc., according to a petition presented to the Multnomah county legislative delegation here last night.

The petition for the plan was presented by Walter R. Whitbeck, Portland insurance man who said that the profits of the telephone company were being pyramided on high charges of service.

Skiing Party in Avalanche Path Carried to Death. GLARIS, Switzerland, Jan. 2.—(AP) An avalanche of snow that swept down a mountain-side near here yesterday carried three members of a German skiing party to their deaths.

A group of 15 were crossing a frail bridge over a ravine when the snow descended suddenly and without warning. Twelve members of the party were rescued after great difficulty.

The group was part of a party of German tourists who had been passing the New Year holiday in the Swiss Alps.

ENGLISH AVIATRIX DUE HERE TODAY. PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 3.—(AP)—Mrs. Victor Bruce, English aviatrix, arrived here today from Seattle where her airplane, damaged in landing at Medford about two weeks ago, had been rebuilt.

Mrs. Bruce said her plane performed well on her flight from Seattle.

The round-the-world aviatrix plans to leave for Medford tomorrow but after that her plans are indefinite except that she intends to arrive in San Francisco next Wednesday.
