JURY TO SCENE OF AUTO CRASH IN DAMAGE SUIT

The damage suit of Elmer Pierce, a logging camp employe, against Steve Tramos and Glenn Smith, logging truck operators, was started in the circuit court with the selection of a jury and the departure of that body, in their own cars, to view the scene of the accident. It was understood that the auto expense would be at the rate of a dime a mile, to be borne by the plaintiff.

Pierce seeks \$3000 general damages and \$333 special damages, and alleges that as a result of a crash July 25, last, near the Crater Lake highway, Trail-Hill road junction at Trail his nose was broken "and his breathing impaired."

Pierce, the complaint sets forth, was riding in a Ford delivery truck, as the guest of his employer E. W. Sigelman, and asserts there was an auto smash, as a result of the alleged careless driving of the truck.

It is not expected that the case will be finished before tomorrow, as the jury will not be back from a 23 mile drive to Trail until mid-afternoon.

SPEED PLANS FOR SCHOOL BUILDING

C. Glen Smith, principal of the Medford high school, and Frank Clark, local architect, left last night for Portland to speed the work on drafting of plans for the new Medford school buildings, Supt. E. H. Hedrick stated this morning.

Mr. Clark is having considerable work on drafting of plans for the buildings done by Knibben & Powell, Portland architects. The plans will be completed the middle of this month, according to Mr. Clark's announcement.

The necessity for a second bond election, which will be held January 15, will not delay the calls for bids. They will be called for as soon as the plans are completed.

The school board will let bids for both buildings at the same time in order to give the contractors a chance to bid on each or both the buildings. A 5 per cent margin will be allowed local contractors over outside concerns, according to the board's announcement.

CUT BAGGAGE RATE ON AIRPLANE LINES

A reduction in excess baggage rates of 50 per cent has just been announced by the Boeing System air lines on the San Francisco-Chicago and Portland-Seattle-San Diego routes. The same rates have also been put into force at all points on the West Coast Air Transport's system, and on the Transcontinental and Western Air, Inc. planes.

The new baggage rates are based on one-half of one per cent of the fare between points on air route and will allow 20 pounds to be carried free by each passenger.

Aviators say he has proved his right to the title "most scientific flier in the service."

He left Eugene Sunday to locate the plane and make arrangements for bringing it out of the snow, six feet at Emigrant lake, where he had landed. The ship is only slightly damaged and it is possible it will be brought by sleighs. Otherwise it will be covered up and brought out in the spring.
