

Valley Folk Have Copy Of Newspaper Carrying Death Geo. Washington

Enclosed in heavy black borders are the stories on the inside pages, yellow and worn—for the stories in Volume 11, Number 88 of the Uster County Gazette, published in New York, January 4th, 1899, bring news of the death of George Washington. And the Congressional library has been searching for a copy of the newspaper, now in possession of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Ely of the Old Stage road, for more than 50 years, according to a recent radio broadcast reported by local citizens.

Mr. and Mrs. Ely have wired the library regarding their possession. A duplicate of the newspaper, 130 years old, was reported in the broadcast.

And from that report the story grows. A short time ago Mr. and Mrs. Ely returned to their orchard home from a trip through Texas, bringing with them the yellowed but well preserved newspaper, carrying the date line "January 4th, 1899."

It came to them on a rainy day in Texas. While visiting at the ranch house of an old acquaintance he showed them the paper, which he had kept in his trunk for 40 years. Mr. Ely expressed great interest in the copy exclaiming, "I would love to have that" and the

first president, and news of hosts of other events, history attributes to the year 1899.

The advertisement is also characteristic of a past century, one of them reading, "For sale one half of a saw mill, also a stout, healthy negro wench."

The date when the advertisement was submitted to the newspaper is printed in full in large letters at the bottom of the ad.

One which shows that domestic turmoil was known in the 80's, as well as now, carries a "second notice on my wife, Hannah" and informs the world that the man in the case is no longer responsible for her debts.

HUMANE WORKERS HALT BULL FIGHT IN EASTERN ARENA

A letter from the American Humane association, with headquarters in Albany, N. Y., recently received by the Jackson County Humane society, tells in an interesting manner how Sidney Franklin's proposed bill fight in New Jersey was halted. The letter is of special interest to local humane workers as a telegram from the Jackson county society was among the protests wired to New Jersey.

"The United States told Mr. Sidney Franklin in no ambiguous language that if he wanted to show his skill with bulls he had better go to Spain. We are proud of our societies' proud of the membership of the American Humane association, proud of the American press and its editorial writers."

"As soon as we were aware that the bull fight was to be held in Newark, President Coleman got to work at the New York end in conjunction with the New Jersey S. P. C. A. An emphatic protest was lodged. Mrs. Minnie Madden Fiske was in from start to finish, invoking all powers within reach and beyond.

"Some societies lined up their entire membership. Protests by the hundreds poured in upon Governor Larson, the mayor of Newark and others.

"There was no let up. We were just about ready for the next move when word came that we had won a fight for the decency of America. 'Bull fight cancelled.'"
