

### AUTO INSURANCE SCHEME A FAKE IS DECLARATION

Of special interest to many Medford car owners is an article recently published in the Oregonian telling of the investigation of the Union National Automobile association. The same association, which is accused of swindling, worked in this city thru traveling agents.

The article reads:

Any Oregon motorist who remitted \$29.50 for a full membership in the Union National Automobile association (with offices in Los Angeles) and received a policy which purported to protect him from accident liability and to provide him with free towing in the event that his car refused to budge was probably swindled out of exactly \$29.50, according to a report received yesterday by T. Ray Conway, manager of the public relations department of the Oregon State Motor association. The company recently was raided by officers of the "bunco" squad of the Los Angeles police department.

A brief survey of the defunct company's books revealed that more than 12,000 trusting motorists had contributed and that the involved money taken from them represented a sum between \$300,000 and \$600,000. Eight men, ex-

ecutives and salesmen, were arrested on charges which involved grand theft and petty theft. According to reports salesmen sold their policies with the information that the organization was formed with a merger of the Union Automobile club and the National Automobile club.

Members of the raiding force said that the company had been under investigation by their department for more than a year.

### ULSTER GAZETTE HELD IN FAMILY FOR MANY YEARS
