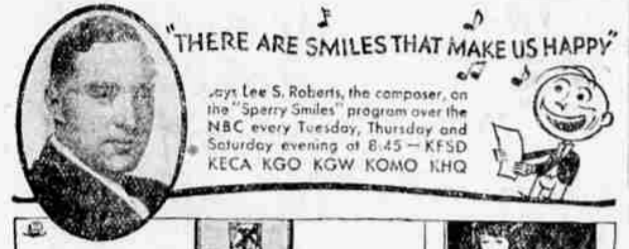
Mrs. Weed Is Chosen President
