LOCALS NEVER HEADED AFTER FIRST TIPOFF

Medford high school expected little difficulty in defeating Grants Pass, 33 to 11, last night, on the tiny floor of the Josephine county gymnasium before a crowd that packed the limited space to capacity. Many local students and fans made the chilly trip to see the first clash of the Southern Oregon conference series.

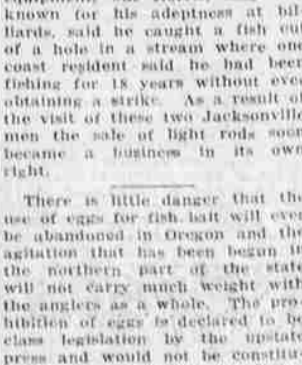

Egg fishermen are legion and a majority of the tourist anglers coming to southern Oregon are addicted to the use of eggs, always found of advantage when fish refuse to bite flies and for use in lakes of this section. Some local anglers say they believe only in flies but allegations are cast that they would readily use eggs when there are no other fishermen around to check up on them.
