WEST WILL ENJOY BETTER BUSINESS SAYS PEPPERDINE



LOS ANGELES, Calif., Jan. 11.—Declaring that while business conditions during the first six months of 1931 will show only a gradual improvement over the last six months of the past year, nevertheless conditions generally appear promising for the West during this year, George Pepperdine, president of the Western Auto Supply Co. in a talk at a luncheon given in speaking before the annual conference of district managers and field superintendents of the supply company recently.

"When conditions are unsettled and every line of business is experiencing unnatural periods of expansion and depression, no one knows exactly where he stands or what can safely be done, but at the present time we can see that business is settling down to a long stretch of steady running during which time many insecure concerns both in manufacturing and retailing, will be eliminated," stated the executive. "The conservative, well financed and properly managed concerns will progress more rapidly than others because of their ability to render the greatest possible service to the public. In other words, it will be the survival of the fittest in business."

"Competition will be exceptionally keen in the automotive industry and the dealers in automobiles, tires and accessories who can offer the best values and the most efficient service will be rewarded with the bulk of the business."

YULETIDE METEOR OF NORTH IDAHO DEFIES LOCATION

LEWISTON, Idaho, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Almost two weeks after its fall, the "Christmas meteor" which started North Idaho remained unlocated, although several searching parties have been sent out. The celestial visitor which made the air crackle and whistle as it plunged through the skies above several small cities, cast a radiant glow, then split into three parts and apparently exploded, eye-witnesses said. It was noticed at Boville, Troy, Lewiston, Moscow, and many other places. Mrs. Joseph Holland of Boville said it reminded her of the "Star of Bethlehem." She saw it as she returned from Christmas eve services. Little attention was paid to the meteor on Christmas day, but thereafter search parties began to comb the uninhabited sections of the country.

Scholars confessed profound interest in it, saying it was similar to one which fell in the Seven Devils country several years ago. The search was made difficult by varying stories of witnesses, those in each town saying it fell toward some other district.

The City Council of Medford is hereby directed to issue an order authorizing the City Engineer to lay out a sewer line from the intersection of East Main Street and Eastwood Drive to the intersection of East Main Street and Eastwood Drive, thence East on East Main Street to the intersection of East Main Street and Eastwood Drive, thence South on Eastwood Drive to the intersection of Keene Way Drive, thence East on Keene Way Drive to the intersection of Woodlawn Drive, thence in a North-easterly direction on Keene Way Drive to the intersection of Woodlawn Drive, thence in an Easterly direction on Woodlawn Drive to a point West of Lot 1, Block 4, Siskiyou Heights Addition; thence East through Lots 1 and 2, Block 4, Siskiyou Heights Addition to the intersection of Barnburg Road and Oakwood Drive; thence East on Oakwood Drive to the intersection of Windsor Avenue.

Beginning at above line at intersection of Oakwood Drive and Groveland Avenue; thence North along Groveland Avenue to the intersection of East Main Street; thence East along East Main Street to a point due South of the Southwest corner of Lot 29, Block 3, Euclid Park Addition, Medford, Oregon; thence North on line between Lots 19 and 20, 6 and 7, Block 3; and Lots 19 and 20, Block 1, to the Northwest corner of Lot 29, Block 1, Euclid Park Addition; thence East on Valley View Drive to the intersection of Hillcrest Road; thence East on Hillcrest Road to the East line of Lyman Avenue.

Beginning at the intersection of Oregon Terrace and Crown Street; thence East on Crown Street to the intersection of Crown Street and Hill Street.

And it is the opinion that said trunk sewer may be used by the property fronting on the streets wherein said trunk sewer has been laid, as a lateral sewer without materially interfering with the use thereof for the purpose for which it was originally laid. And Whereas, said trunk sewer has not as yet been paid for. Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved By The City Council of the City of Medford, Oregon:

Section 1. That in the opinion of the said Council, that that part of the said trunk sewer laid in the City of Medford, described as follows, to-wit:

Beginning on East Main Street 140 feet West of the intersection of East Main Street and Eastwood Drive; thence East on East Main Street to the intersection of East Main Street and Eastwood Drive; thence South on Eastwood Drive to the intersection of Keene Way Drive; thence in a North-easterly direction on Keene Way Drive to the intersection of Woodlawn Drive; thence in an Easterly direction on Woodlawn Drive to a point West of Lot 1, Block 4, Siskiyou Heights Addition; thence East through Lots 1 and 2, Block 4, Siskiyou Heights Addition to the intersection of Barnburg Road and Oakwood Drive; thence East on Oakwood Drive to the intersection of Windsor Avenue.

Beginning at above line at intersection of Oakwood Drive and Groveland Avenue; thence North along Groveland Avenue to the intersection of East Main Street; thence East along East Main Street to a point due South of the Southwest corner of Lot 29, Block 3, Euclid Park Addition, Medford, Oregon; thence North on line between Lots 19 and 20, 6 and 7, Block 3; and Lots 19 and 20, Block 1, to the Northwest corner of Lot 29, Block 1, Euclid Park Addition; thence East on Valley View Drive to the intersection of Hillcrest Road; thence East on Hillcrest Road to the East line of Lyman Avenue.

Beginning at the intersection of Oregon Terrace and Crown Street; thence East on Crown Street to the intersection of Crown Street and Hill Street.

And it is the opinion that said trunk sewer may be used by the property fronting on the streets wherein said trunk sewer has been laid, as a lateral sewer without materially interfering with the use thereof for the purpose for which it was originally laid. And Whereas, said trunk sewer has not as yet been paid for. Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved By The City Council of the City of Medford, Oregon:

Section 2. It is the intention of the City Council to assess the property fronting on the streets wherein said trunk sewer is laid, its proportionate share of so much of the cost of the same as will result in said benefit which will result to said property from the use of said trunk sewer as a lateral sewer of such size as would be required to supply the property fronting on the streets, or portions thereof in case said trunk sewer was not so used, and the Council has determined that the sum of \$13,500 for the cost of the same, plus a special benefit and the proportionate cost of such a lateral sewer to such property, as aforesaid, and intends to assess said amount against such adjacent property on account thereof.

Section 3. The Council will meet at the hour of 7:30 o'clock P. M. February 3rd, 1931, at the Council Chamber in the City Hall, at which time and place all persons of said property as aforesaid will be heard.

Section 4. The City Recorder is hereby directed to serve notice hereof upon the property owners aforesaid by publishing this Resolution Three (3) times in a newspaper, published and of general circulation in said City, and by posting the same in five (5) public places in said City at least Ten (10) days before the date of said meeting.
