Kisses in Medford Lack Influence Upon Digestion Claimed By Noted Editor

"The bliss of a kiss measures happiness" — so poets and songsters say. But Dr. Frank H. Vitzelly, dictionary editor, in an article in Radio Digest, goes a bit further. Now that the practical winter season is here, more practical than usual, and spring several months away, he says in behalf of the age old custom, "Kissing is good for the digestion."

And in response, teen of Medford, and women too, who prefer not to be quoted, say, "Neither is true."

On scientific authority, Dr. Vitzelly avers that in kissing only beneficial organisms are encountered and that the advantages of the practice far outweigh its infinitesimal risks, for it provides the kissers with microbes useful for digestion.

A well known Medford business man replies, "A kiss that is good for the digestion is bad for the morals," and concludes with "It brings into play a lot of microbes all right."

Dr. Vitzelly continues, "It will probably be found that the beneficial organisms required flourish in greatest abundance on the lips of the young and comely."

And another Medford business man substantiates his argument by stating, "The effect of kissing on the digestion depends entirely upon the person you choose to kiss."

And still another replied, when interviewed on the weighty question this morning, "If the wife is around it's bad for your digestion." His companion answered, "Kiss-

ing is one thing and digestion another. When I'm romantic I don't want to eat. I'm just romantic." And a woman, emphatically replied, "A kiss may be good for digestion, but it's also good for a lot of it—crying," which is rather hard on Mr. Vitzelly's definition of a kiss. It reads: "It is a seal that expresses sincere affection; a pledge of future union; a gift, which as given, takes from us the impression of our heart; a crimson balsam for the heart-broken soul; in fact, kisses are the grains of gold and silver, precious stones from the mind of the heart—that enrich the store of happiness when hearts are surcharged with love's electricity."
