

# HOUSE PASSES \$910,000 FUND FOR PARK ROAD

### Crater Lake Would Profit By Two-Year Construction Program Embodied in Leavitt Bill.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—(AP)—The house today passed the Leavitt bill authorizing a two-year \$910,000 program for constructing national park roads and extending them outward to connect with the federal aid highway system.

It now goes to the senate. The bill directs the secretary of interior to spend an authorized appropriation of \$7,500,000 during each of the fiscal years 1932 and 1933 on building approach roads.

These approaches are limited to 60 miles, not more than 40 miles of which may be in any one county, and must lead across land at least 90 per cent owned by the government.

The park service furnished tentative requirements for approach roads which would be wholly or partly supplied under the Leavitt bill. They included Crater Lake, \$910,000; Lassen Volcanic, \$2,016,000 and Mount Rainier \$845,000.

# MYRTLE PT. GIRL TELLS WILD YARN

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Freda Garman, 19, of Myrtle Point, Ore., and Lola Sanchez, 20, of Merced, Cal., complained last night to police they had been kidnapped and attacked, but physicians found no confirmation of their story and they were detained on suspicion.

Police learned that the younger girl, who had been living at Myrtle Point several years with two uncles, Earl and Charles Adams, had appeared in Merced several months ago with a man who had posed as her husband, giving the name of Garman and who is in jail there on a bad check charge.

# WOODSMEN HURT BY FALL ON AXE

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 14.—(AP) Clinton Bamber of Sutherlin was brought to a hospital here today suffering from an axe wound which nearly severed his right arm at the shoulder.

He was cutting brush near Mount Scott when a dead limb fell from a snag, struck him on the back and sent him forward upon the edge of the axe.

Bamber's companions, Carl Thornton and Amir Popiel, clamped the arteries, bound the wound and halted bleeding, and then brought Bamber five miles on horseback to a road east of Sutherlin.

# ERUPTIONS SHAKE ARGENTINA REGION

**Regulate Charity.**  
The abuse of county charity is the target of a bill introduced by Senator Woodward and Representative Dorothy McCallough Lee. It provides that persons applying for county aid must have lived in the county at least six months and the state at least a year. It also provides that time spent in or on parole from a public institution or private charitable institution shall not be counted in the time of residence.

Governor Julius L. Meier held his first conference with members of the press this morning, and arranged for daily conferences throughout the session and his administration. He stated that "I want you to always feel welcome to call on me." Some of his announcements would be issued from the executive offices in written form, he announced.

# RING CZARS MAY DUEL OVER SITE OF HEAVY BOUT

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Max Schmeling and W. L. Young, Ringing have signed for a heavy-weight title bout to be held in June and thereby precipitated what may develop into a bitter duel between the New York State Athletic commission and Madison Square Garden corporation.

Under terms of a contract drawn up and signed yesterday, Schmeling and Stripling will meet in a city to be selected 30 or more days before the match, with the winner defending the title against Primo Carnera, Italian man-mountain, in September. Carnera arrived here from Europe yesterday.

The contract was signed by representatives of the three heavyweights with the Madison Square Garden corporation of Illinois, a subsidiary of the New York garden.
