LISBON SEEKS RETURN OF SIDEWALK CAFES

LISBON.—(AP)—Urging that the open-air cafe is a lure for tourists, restaurant owners of this capital are asking the city to revoke a decree barring chairs and tables from public sidewalks.

The favorite lounging places of thousands of Portuguese citizens disappeared overnight when the edict was put into effect. Their walls of anguish were long and loud.

Formerly there was almost a continuous string of wicker chairs and tables under the shade of green palms along the Avenida, the "Boulevard" of Lisbon.

PLANE TENDER SUPPLIES PRE-HEATED OIL, WATER

ATLANTA, Ga.—(AP)—An airport tender which delivers oil and water heated to a temperature of 150 degrees to airplanes has been put in service at Candler Field.

By preheating the oil and water it is not necessary to put airplane motors through a "warming up" process before the take-off.

Insulated water and oil tanks kept warm by immersion heaters thermostatically controlled are a part of the tender's equipment.

Arrives for Hites. COLON, Panama, Jan. 14.—(AP) Dr. Ricardo Alfaro, former minister to the United States and now president designate of the new Panama government, arrived here today from New York for his inauguration.

Major Recovering. BOSTON, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Doctors attending Major-General Clarence R. Edwards today reported the wartime commander of the Yankee division, resting "very comfortably." General Edwards was operated on for intestinal trouble yesterday.

Taxes Too High. NEW GALLOWAY, Scotland.—(AP)—This smallest royal burgh in Scotland was 200 years old in December, but there was no celebration. Because of a high tax rating, a movement has started to have the royal charter withdrawn and put New Galloway under jurisdiction of the county council.

Diet Hits Wheat Market. PARIS.—(AP)—Dieting by women is affecting the wheat market. So say French bakers who are opposed to diet bread. Consumption of white bread in France has diminished nearly 12 per cent, largely the bakers say, because of propaganda favoring bread made of other grains.
