HEALTH MEASURE OF INTEREST HERE

The members of the Jackson County Health association and of the county health unit are much interested in a bill approved by the Oregon state board of health at its recent annual meeting, to be presented to the present legislature for the establishment of whole-time units, and county boards of health.

According to the bill the county board of health would be constituted as follows: Representative of the county court, the mayor of the county seat, the county superintendent of schools, two physicians selected by the local medical society, one dentist selected by the local dental society, and a seventh member to be selected by the rest of the board.


