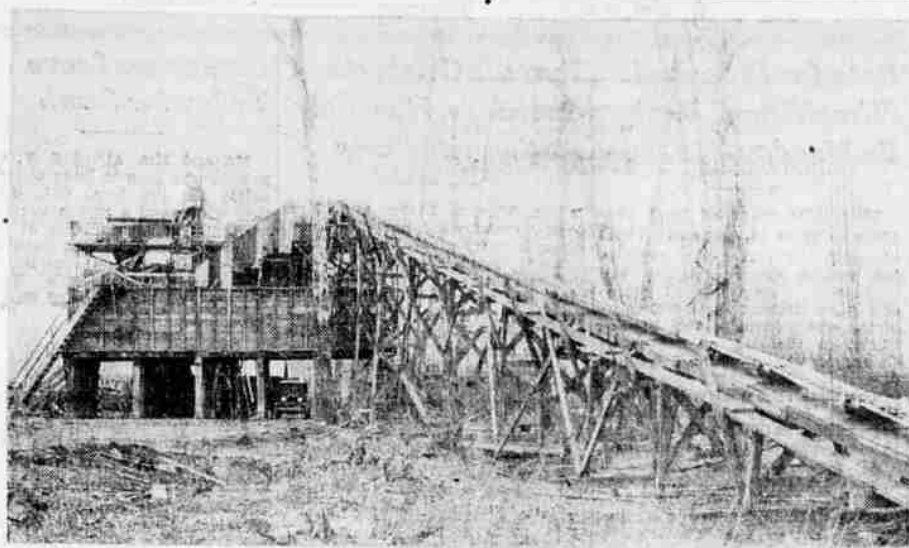


New Screening Plant Completed Near Medford
