Mrs. Gwendolyn Woodcock, who was installed as Worthy Patron, entered the lodge rooms to the strains of a march, played by her little son, Dick.

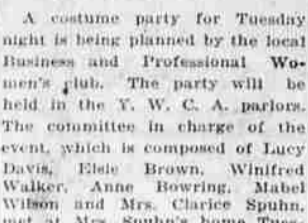
