BUTTER SCARCITY FORCES UPTURNS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22.—(AP) Increasing shortage of fresh butter receipts on the Portland market since the first of the week was reflected by an exceptionally strong tone in the wholesale market at opening today. Produce exchange quotation on standard cubes was up a cent, on a level with extras, unchanged at 25 cents.

A corresponding advance of 1 cent a pound in butterfat bids was announced by creameries. Egg trading was of only fair proportion with receipts more than ample and some dealers forcing sales at shaded prices.

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—(AP) The share market made one of the most spirited recoveries of the new year today.

Although trading was only moderately active, the day's turnover of about 175,000 shares was the largest recorded in an advancing market in a fortnight, notably Auburn, which rose more than 6 points. Owing to the small floating supply, shorts in this issue have found themselves in tight positions several times of late.

Shares closing 2 to 3 points higher embraced a wide range of rails, utilities, specialties, and miscellaneous manufacturing shares.
