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DEMOCRATIC BYRD GIVES AUTOGRAPH TO MEDFORD BOYS

An illustration of the innate modesty and democraticness of Admiral Richard E. Byrd, despite his fame and popularity, was seen in the DeVoe confectionery establishment last Saturday night when the noted aviator-explorer, following his lecture at the Holly theater and return to his room at the Hotel Medford, dropped into that place near the hotel to get a lunch. As he seated himself on a stool near the rear end of the lunch counter he was at once recognized by the other customers, including a group of high school boys who gathered with awe nearby to see what the lunch of the famous man would consist of.

John Smith, waiter, familiarly known as "Schmitty," who had been busy when the admiral in uniform entered and did not recognize him until he was in front of him and about to say with his customary breeziness, "Well, sarge, what will you have?" caught himself in time to cut out the "Sarge" part.

"A glass of malted milk and a cheese sandwich" was the reply, which surprised the high school youths, who had an idea that great men only ate the costliest kind of pastry and other dainties.

The eager boys could hardly wait until the admiral had finished eating and drinking, when they closed in on him with a request that he write for them his autograph.

Admiral Byrd was plainly not overjoyed at the request, but after hesitating a second or two broke out with his famous smile and half grudgingly replied, "Oh, all right," and then showing the remains of his repast to one side wrote his name on scraps of paper which the boys handed him.

Then, as he walked out of the store he stopped long enough to remark to U. G. Coleman, proprietor, that "If I granted every request for my autograph every place I go I would probably do nothing else the remainder of my life but sign my name."

"The first year it is rather sweet and you don't mind it so much, but the second year such adulation begins to pall on you and after that—well, it's hard to have any privacy whatever. After you do not want to be regarded as a grouch, yet in self preservation you must draw the line somewhere. You cannot greet everybody or sign your name for everybody. Well, and the cheery smile again broke forth, "Good-night, boys."

faces. But they twitch their big toes, and lawyers watch their feet. A well known capitalist twitched his thumb when bluffing at poker and lost large sums until he began holding the cards with four fingers, the thumb kept hidden.

The Red Cross in Arkansas has begun feeding children that reach the public schools too hungry to study. And Arkansas is not the only state with hungry children. In Ohio, a rural school principal wrote asking how she could keep her 125 school children from starving. Inspection of lunch boxes revealed in some cases a cold potato, in others a hard biscuit, with a small piece of salt pork.

How soon will a government that has decided to feed children's minds with books and teachers, realize that a starved body cannot learn, and add food for the body to provide food for the brain? If the government wants to help the

farmers, afflicted with overproduction of food, why not let the farmers feed the children? That would do more to help farmers than storing \$6,000,000 bushels of government wheat in grain elevators.

This is written in a fertile country. F. A. Shense, farmer, has four more children than he had last week. His wife, with two children on each arm, looks happy, but tired. Her two boys and two girls were born between 9 and 9:25 in the evening. They weigh 17 pounds and are healthy. This offsets four young women that keep their maiden names in marriage, and decide that having children is bad for the figure.

Russia's newspapers make fun of our congressional committee, of the activities of "Reds" or Communists and say with considerable truth, that the report of a great Communist outbreak in America "reflects capitalist fear." Next to a man with a basket of eggs on his head, the most nervous human is one with a few millions in the bank. He thinks everybody wants to get them, and he is right. But fear makes things worse. And, if our distinguished, neat minds don't find some way of supplying employment, or at least food, in the world's richest country, they will have other worries that will make them forget about Russia.

Mussolini continues to succeed. His air squadron flies the Atlantic to Brazil in military formation, something never done before. Thus he takes the edge from the Prince of Wales' salesmanship visit to South America. And now Italy reports a death rate reduced and a birth rate increased. Births are more than 25 per 1000, deaths in 1930 dropped from 16.1 to 13.7 per 1000. In Italy last year 1,085,163 babies were born. Plenty of ability in those little heads.

Italy's birth rate contradicts the assertion that Mussolini is overworking his people. When a nation is tired the supply of new babies falls off.

F. C. Goodenough, great British banker, suggests "purely as a business proposition" that this country should cancel all its war debts. It is wise, says the banker, to keep your buying customers solvent. The proposition, if accepted, would cost this country ten billions, assuming that payment is probable, and it would save Britain five billions. "As a pure business proposition," American taxpayers would want time to think that over.
