Conditions in Canada are not particularly enjoyable, according to a letter received by Mrs. Elizabeth Coulter in Jacksonville from the Joe Kitto family, formerly of Jacksonville, residing in Louisiana, Alberta, Canada. The letter was written a week ago. There are nine children in the family.

It says in part: "We have been having a splendid winter here and I guess it has been a good thing for so many have had to go short on clothing. Wheat is selling for 25 cents a bushel and barley for 10 cents. It can't hardly be sold for that price, so people are burning wheat in the stove, and some are without wheat or flour. We have been going fishing and eat fish three times a day. It's not had eating, either. We are all anxious to get back where the fruit grows."
