FARM WOMEN FURNISH IDEAS FOR SESSIONS

Homemakers' Economic Conference Will Sift Facts Collected Jackson County Survey.

Conferences in session at the city library today preparatory to the Jackson County Farm Homemakers' Economic conference, which will begin two weeks from today, are a fine illustration of the democratic plan of Oregon State college's farm extension work. Miss Claribel Nye, state leader of the home economics extension, stated this morning, while discussing the work to be accomplished at these preliminary conferences, which will be in session again tomorrow. "Let us begin the farm women a list of their needs and chief interests and develop from them a program for extension work. We realize the need for soliciting the farm women's ideas."

Plan Program "These four committee meetings being held in the city library today and tomorrow are for the purpose of having the experience and help that a small group of homemakers can give in studying material, contributed by many homemakers and formulating a program for sectional meetings of the conference to be held next month." The personnel of the committees in session is as follows: Foods and nutrition, Mesdames J. R. McCracken, R. C. Ward, C. A. Brown, Lela Shepherd, Arnold Bohner, Cora Hoffman, Alma Meyer, Myrtle Charles, Luile Vera Dick, Straus, C. R. Moore, Vera Ringler. Clothing and textiles, Mesdames J. L. Edwards, J. E. Gowland, Jay Terrill, L. D. Moservey, W. W. Hartley, W. H. Higgins, Lee Port, Ralph Wilcox, W. T. Brown, L. J. Frink, Frank Parlow. Cost of living, Mesdames Effie Birdseye, A. T. Lathrop, O. C. Maust, Wm. Glenn, Harry Brown, Frank Brown, Victor Burrell. Following the economic conference the county extension committee with the agent and college extension staff will develop a program based upon the findings of the farm homemakers, Miss Nye stated. "We don't aim to teach progressive farmers what we think they need, but to give them what they know and show us what is most useful to them."
