In this arduous trip all of the hardships and dangers of travel, including at that time, were faced. Sickness, trouble with the Indians, discomfort of the desert—the long journey was one to daunt less brave and hardy souls.

In the same train was Wm. J. Gregory, the young man whom she married November 24, 1861, and with whom she established a claim near Central Point. Here they reared their family of seven children, four of whom survive. Of the latter, Mr. Will Gregory lives now on a part of the old home ranch.

In later years, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Gregory spent several winters in Ashland and have many friends who are interested in all that concerns them. Mr. Gregory died a few years ago, and Mrs. Gregory lives in Central Point in her own comfortable home, with her children near by.

Mrs. Lucinda Weeden, a daughter lives with her children on a ranch on Applegate. Mr. Henry Gregory lives near Central Point. Mrs. Elizabeth Owen lives in Central Point and Mr. Will Gregory on the old home place.
