

Sports MEDFORD WINS OVERTIME TILT FROM SHASTA

Odd Hughes' Floor Play And Shooting Brilliant—Stubborn Defense of Visitors Keeps Score Down—Last Half Rally Wins.

A large crowd of basketball fans filled the armory last night and cheered themselves hoarse when Medford High school defeated St. Shasta City by the close score of 24 to 22, and it took an overtime period to accomplish that. The feature of the game was the close defense of the visitors and the brilliant work of Odd Hughes and Ivan Harrington for Medford.

In the opening quarter both teams played with caution. Medford showed up better on its offense but was checked so closely by the Shasta five-man zone defense that they could get no close shots. However, Clay and Caldwell found the basket in some long shots pretty well outside the defense line. The game was tied at the end of the quarter with the score, Medford 7, Shasta 5.

In the second quarter Medford opened up and the game got rough. Clay and Howarth were penalized on a double and each converted. Shortly after Coach Burcher sent in his second string while the home team had a comfortable lead of eleven points. The visitors tore into the second quarter to get a field goal and two converted free throws, at the same time keeping Medford scoreless to the end of the half. Score at half, Medford 14, Shasta 7.

By this time it was evident that Shasta was not as finished a team as Medford and it looked like the second half would be a walk-over. The visitors, however, came back with their usual strong defense but amazed the crowd with their smashing attack. In a few minutes the score stood reversed and Shasta had the long end of a 15 to 14 board. The crowd went on their feet and made the rafters ring when Odd Hughes on a beautiful play under the basket hooked one in again reversing the counters, Medford 16, Shasta 15.

The cheers of the Medford supporters were short-lived for Edwards, center and outstanding player for the visitors found the basket. Medford reversed this and again Shasta took back the lead. Again and again the fortunes of war changed until the crowd became delirious when but a few seconds remained and Shasta led 22 to 20. Just before the end of the period Odd Hughes got away and shot a beauty tying the score.

In the overtime Caldwell broke the jinx and the visitors broke when after Caldwell's field goal Hughes duplicated. Then Medford stalled to the end of the period and the score stood at 26 to 22 in favor of Medford. At the last gun students rushed on the floor to carry Harrington around on their shoulders as this was his last game.

IDAHO, STANFORD, OREGON QUINT AND UCLAS SCORE UPSET VICTORIES

MOSCOW, Idaho, Jan. 24.—(AP)—The University of Idaho outplayed Washington State college's basketball team throughout their game tonight and won 30 to 25. The Vandals were in the lead throughout except for a short time in the second half. Regarding the lead Idaho ran the score to 30 to 25, after which the Cougar scored one basket. Close guarding by the Vandals kept the W. S. C. players in check. Huntley Gordon, State college center, was held in check by Kenneth Parks, who played a brilliant game. Drummond, guard, and Wickes, forward, tallied nine points each for Idaho. McLarny, guard, led the Cougar scorers with eight points. This was Idaho's first victory in the northern division of the Pacific coast conference.

OAKLAND, Cal., Jan. 24.—(AP)—Stanford University's basketball team ended a five year losing streak at the hands of California here tonight by defeating the Bears 37 to 32 in a game that required five minutes extra time to determine a winner. At the end of the regular playing time, the score was tied at 30-29, but Stanford outscored the Bears 7 to 2 in the extra period. More excitement and thrills were packed into the last ten minutes of the game, than has been seen in any single contest on this floor for the last few years. Seventy-five hundred spectators were on their feet constantly during the closing moments.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Taking a quick lead at the start, the University of California at Los Angeles fought off a Southern California rally in the second half and won easily 25 to 16 in a rough basketball game featured by Linticum's goal shooting and excellent floor work of Lubin at guard. At the second half opening, Bill Pierce registered a brace of field goals and Caldwell two free throws for Southern California. Being the score at 12 all, Linticum, however, came right back with two field shots and after that E. C. L. A. was ahead for the rest of the game, two complete teams being used. Lubin of the Bruins and Frank Gardner of Southern California went out of the game on personal fouls, which totaled 24 for both teams. The victory puts E. C. L. A. in the Pacific coast conference lead since California lost tonight to Stanford. U. C. L. A.'s only conference defeat to date was by California.

BAMBINO LEAVES TL COBB OFF HIS STAR SELECTIONS

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—(AP)—They were sitting around the tea-trays in the locker room after 18 blustery holes of golf, in freezing weather over the course of the North Hempstead country club on Long Island, when Babe Ruth was asked to pick an all-star baseball array, just to warm up argument. Basing his selections on his own personal observations over the last 15 or 20 years, he named the following: First base—Hal Chase. Second base—Larry Lajoie. Shortstop—Hans Wagner. Third base—Joe Cobb. Left field—Ty Cobb. Right field—Harry Hooper. Catcher—Ray Schalk. Pitchers—Christy Mathewson, Eddie Plank and Herbert Pennock.

Little or no dispute arose as the bats clicked off the names of his infield. Quite a few might prefer the great Eddie Collins as the keystone sack or Bill Terry at first, but the consensus of Ruth's hearers was that it would be extremely difficult, if not impossible, to put together a better infield quartet, so far as modern times are concerned. The outfield, however, came close to being heretofore, as he showed a strong inclination to leave off Ty Cobb as well as Tris Speaker. Unfortunately though his exit from the game, "Shoelace" Joe Jackson unquestionably ranked with the great outfielders of all time Ruth's opinion. He had no superior as a natural hitter.

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 24.—(AP)—For the fourth time in five years George Lott, young Davis cup ace, won the Canadian indoor tennis singles championship today. The Chicagoan outdistanced another young Davis cup player, John Van Ryn of Philadelphia, in a spectacular final round struggle to win 6-2, 5-7, 7-5, 1-6, 6-3. Lott won the title in 1927 and 1928, surrendered it to J. Gilbert Hall of South Orange, N. J., in 1929 and regained it last year. Lott's triumph today was gained only after a grueling match in which every point had to be fought for.

Lott and Van Ryn later teamed up and won the double championship, conquering J. Court Hall of South Orange, N. J., and E. W. Leash of Montreal, in straight sets. The American Davis cup player won this first set after a titanic struggle, 13-16, and then swept through the final and his Canadian partner for the next two sets in easy fashion, 6-3, 6-1.

OREGON QUINT THREATENS BUT HUSKY 5 WINS

University Starts With Rush And Take Early Lead Until Washington Offensive Starts to Click—Plays O. S. C. Monday.

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 24.—(AP)—The University of Washington chalked up its sixth consecutive Northwest Division Pacific coast basketball conference victory here tonight, defeating the University of Oregon, 38 to 26. The Webfoots started out as if they intended to avenge the defeat the Huskies handed them last night. They scored five points before Washington mounted its first score. Then Cairney, Washington guard, converted a free throw and he and Swanson found the hoop in quick succession for field goals. Once the Huskies got together in their offensive plans they moved steadily forward and at half time were leading, 15 to 11.

The Webfoots came in with a rush in the second period and Stevens sent a long one through the hoop. That was the last time Oregon threatened to sew up the score. Roberts, Oregon center, had the jump on Swanson in tonight's game and consistently took the tip-off. But the Huskies seemed to be prepared, lost little time in getting possession of the ball and working it down within scoring distance. Swanson dropped in three successive field goals in the last few minutes of play. He was high scorer of the game with 14 points. Washington next plays Oregon State at Corvallis Monday and Tuesday.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Football is still on the sport calendar in this section. Tomorrow at Kezar stadium two all-star eleven featuring many former college stars, will clash in a charity contest sponsored by the Knights of Columbus. The midwinter classic will bring together such performers as Joe Savoldi, fullback on last year's Notre Dame team; Ernie Nevers, former Stanford fullback; Larry Bettencourt, center, and Ike Franklan, end, two ex-St. Mary's stars. Nevers, Bettencourt and Franklan were all-American players of their day. Savoldi will lead one of the teams. He will be assisted by such luminaries as Russ Saunders, quarterback; Don Moses, halfback, both former Southern California men; Benny Leon and "Briek" Marcus, former California halfbacks. Bettencourt and Franklan will act as captains of the local squads, composed mostly of former St. Mary's players. Proceeds of the game will be used to aid unemployed.

THURNBLAD WITH REISELT RETAIN 3-CUSHION LEAD

CHICAGO, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Arthur Thurnblad of Chicago and the fiery Otto Reiselet of Philadelphia extended their winning streaks to four each and remained deadlocked for the technical feat in the world's three-cushion billiard championship fight today. Thurnblad breezed an easy victory in swamping Frank Seaville of Buffalo, 39 to 47 in 53 innings, while Reiselet was forced to fight the hardest match in the tournament to keep his slate clean. He gained a 41 to 29 edge on Charles Jordan of Los Angeles in the 13rd inning but the contest was snuffed and had the result in doubt until Reiselet clocked off his final point. Reiselet's high run, eight points, was the tournament record. Jordan, loser of four straight games, scored a high four out of five. Seaville has lost four out of five. Thurnblad is the only player to have a 100% record.

MANERO BATTLES DUTRA TO FINALS IN FILM TOURNEY

RIVIERA COUNTRY CLUB, Los Angeles, Jan. 24.—(AP)—The last of the favorites, Tony Manero, slight New Yorker, stood off the determined game of tall, dark Morrie Dutra, Long Beach, Cal., and moved into the final round of the motion picture \$3,200 match play golf tournament today by winning his semi-finals duel 2 and 1.

At the same time a lanky Texas youth, Ralph Gulldahl of Dallas, only a year removed from the amateur ranks, took a 3 and 1 decision over the heavy hitting Fred Morrison, Glendale, Cal. A heavy wind made good scores impossible. Manero earned his place in the semi-finals bracket by defeating Eric Seavill, Los Angeles pro, 5 and 4 in the quarter final this morning. Gulldahl had a narrow squeak in his quarter final play, sinking a fifteen foot putt on the 18th to win from Otto Dutra, Santa Monica, Cal., brother of Morrie, one up. Morris had easy sailing with Neil Christian and brought his morning match to a hasty conclusion by rousing the Portland, Ore., pro, 6 and 5. In winning he won one over par, Morrie Dutra took Clarence Clark of Tulsa, Okla., out of the picture 4 and 3 in the quarter final bracket. The finals tomorrow will be played over 36 holes, the winner taking \$1,000 and the runnerup \$500.

DEMPSEY BACK IN RING AGAIN SAYS OLD PAL

Half Million Will Bring Him Back, and He Wants To Slaughter Carnero—Ex-Champ Eager for Battle.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—(AP)—In more or less official language the word is out today Jack Dempsey will fight again this summer if and wherever some kind gentleman can lay \$500,000 on the line. "You can safely say," whispers Billy Duffy, "that the champ is ready and eager for another comeback. He wants only one fight but he might make two, I have talked it over with him several times. He's ready to go. If old Tex Rickard were still alive, Jack would be in training today. He feels he has at least one more great fight left in his system. At 35 he can't believe he's through. I can't either. Properly trained, he should be at the peak of his physical powers, but where's the promoter? Duffy is the one man in the fight game today who really knows what is going on in the ever-changing, volatile mind of the old man mauler.

It was Duffy who leaned thru the ropes that spectacular night in the Yankee stadium and screamed: "count that man out." When everyone else in the arena was stunned and speechless, Jack Sharkey lay grovelling on the canvas bewildered and helpless and Dempsey needed a friend as he had never needed one before. Duffy directed the attack a few months later when Dempsey floored Gene Tunney for the long count in Chicago and missed retaining the heavyweight championship by the breadth of those extra seconds. He is Dempsey's lone counselor and it has placed him in one of the most difficult spots of his entire career.

The score of 21-29, which marked the outcome of the game, did not quench the spirit of the new team's "galsheviki" manager, Clara Mary Euson, who announced Saturday that the Russian Imperial Guards of Medford will play the Klamath Falls Independents at an early date and are signing for games with every important town team in the state.

The new squad, which threatens to end basketball imperialism without the aid of the Bolshevik army, is composed of Stan Eiden, Fred Greene, Roman Greene, Estil Phillips, Orville Wilson, Lee Frank and Jack Hughes. The loss of Friday night's game is attributed by the local team to the inspiration Jim Grieve's offered the Prospectors when he appeared on the floor prior to the game clad in athlete's apparel. The pep rally which ensued inspired the Prospect team to fight. But the promise of food to follow quenched the minds of the hungry Russians, who thought of little else until the game was ended and refreshments served. The team's manager requests that refreshments not be announced until the close of the game in the next town she invades with her squad.

The Jacksonville quintet put up a strong battle against Jim Grieve's proteges and lost by only one basket. The Jacksonville girls defeated the Prospect tilters by a large score.
