

MILK LAWS PLANNED BY JOE DUNNE

Bills Would Require Dairy Products Meet Grades As Represented—Oleo Hit in Measures Dropped in Hopper.

SALEM, Jan. 27.—(P)—The drink question will come before the present Oregon legislature. It will pertain to milk, however, and not to alcoholic beverages.

The issue is coming up in a series of bills to be introduced by Senator Joe E. Dunne of Portland, providing for the grading of dairy products. Most of the proposed regulations are not to be compulsory on producers and dealers, but will require that products must come up to the fixed grade specifications if they are represented to be of particular grades.

Senator Dunne has begun with an attack on the Oleomargarine trade. His first gun was fired last week when he introduced a measure providing that colored Oleomargarine can not be sold either as butter or as a butter substitute.

His second was yesterday in a bill to prohibit the use of Oleomargarine in state schools and institutions.

Butter Grade Planned

Relative to butter Dunne plans to introduce a bill that would adopt for Oregon the federal butter grades. A cream bill will provide first and second grade and an ungraded classification of that commodity. A proposed milk bill will provide the usual A, B and C grades, its provisions not compulsory except upon persons professing to sell those grades. Under one of his bills confectioners selling malted milk would be required to show whether their product was made of ice cream or merely of frozen milk. He declares that in Portland there are only two places where malted milks made of ice cream can be bought.

Dunne will have another bill providing that when a county or city sets up a standard of milk from abortion free herds it must provide for the reimbursement of farmers who lose cattle by the abortion test.

It is understood that another Oleomargarine bill, sponsored by the State Dairywomen's, the State Grange and the Farmers' Union, will call for a license to be charged the manufacturer, the wholesaler and the retailer of Oleomargarine. J. D. Mickle, state dairy and food commissioner, says that a milk grading bill, different from the Dunne bill, will come in. It also will provide for the A, B and C grades and will not be compulsory. But it will impose certain requirements on producers claiming to furnish those grades. Among these requirements will be milk houses, certain air spaces for cows, and mechanical bottle capers. Its provisions will be the same as those of ordinances now in effect in a number of cities.

COUNTY WOULD BE REIMBURSED ON ROAD FUNDS

Upton Introduces Bill Requiring Return of Money Expended Since 1917 On State Roads.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 27.—(P)—Senator Jay H. Upton of Bend has introduced a bill which would require the state highway commission to reimburse the counties for all money contributed by them for state highway construction since the beginning of the state highway program, in 1917 to the present time. The amount would total about \$15,000,000.

"In the beginning of the highway program," said Upton, explaining the bill, "many sparsely settled counties, in order to get any road construction, were required to contribute as high as 50 per cent of the cost of state highways. Thereafter other counties made contributions in lesser proportions until finally the system of requiring contributions by the counties was generally abandoned. Highways are now being built without requiring counties to contribute to the cost.

Constitutes Burden

"Under the compulsion system then in vogue various counties

have contributed to the highway commission \$15,000,000. Many counties have bonded themselves to the limit, and these bonds constitute a heavy burden on the taxpayers. This bill will return to the taxpayers the money they have been forced to contribute and will relieve the real property in various counties to the extent of \$15,000,000."

All money received by the counties under the act would, by its terms, be used by them for the payment of interest and principal on bonds issued for road purposes. If there were no outstanding road bonds the money might be used for any other purpose.
